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

REGION ONE RELIEF FUND

Greetings everyone!

Yes it's been a long while since we've heard anything about the RI Relief Fund. What is the RI Relief Fund? It is a fund that all members of the region can utilize by submitting an application for assistance to help off-set some of the things that has come up unexpectedly upon you. These things just might be essential medicines not covered by insurance. (Copy of previous prescription receipts necessary), food that cannot be supplied by local assistance organizations, clothing, especially due to fire, flood, or tornado. To pay utilities that cannot be paid by state agencies or local assistance organizations.

The following are examples of emergencies:

Fire or other damage to the home.

Flood or other natural catastrophe.

Eviction from home. (A copy of the eviction notice must accompany the applicant's request).

Unexpected illness or injury causing loss of job or pay. (Copies of medical bills and type of illness or injury necessary).

Robbery or burglary of day-to-day living expenses. (A copy of the police report must accompany the request).

Utilities, i.e. gas/water/electric, where state agencies have refused. (Copy of shutoff notice necessary).

Sudden loss of income, such as loss of employment without notice or severance pay. (Copy of notification, employment security commission filing, etc.)

The Relief Fund will not provide relief for the following events:

- * Missed house or rental payments not showing a valid reason, such as income loss or robbery.
- * Insurance payments.
- * Car payments not showing a critical need.
- * Club or organizational dues.
- * Lost vacation money.
- * Moving expenses, except in special circumstances.
- * Furniture payments, credit card payments, etc.
- * Tax payments.
- * Child support payments.
- * Alimony payments.
- * Gambling losses.
- * Travel expenses.
- * Lawyer's fees.
- * Automotive repair, except in special circumstances.

Upon taking the office of Region One Relief Fund Coordinator I have created an application form, a donations form, and an Outlook stationary. Through subspace communications (email) between myself and Vice Admiral Ruth Lane I have been informed that the current available funds in the RI Relief Fund is \$: 1,107.01 as of March 31st of this year. I have also been informed that there is no PayPal account setup for the region and there are no pending applications for relief.

The application form for RI Relief

Fund assistance can be obtained through the RI Relief Fund office by emailing me directly at jcecil922930@att.net. Yes I do have the application form as a word document file and a PDF file. I do have a donations form for those members here in the region that would like to make a donation to the RI Relief Fund that is also available in both PDF and Word document formats these can be requested from me from the same email address that I just provided. I do plan on having these two documents added to the RI website so that members can download them as they need them and do plan on posting them on the two RI Facebook group pages.

THE INTERNET AND ITS COMPLEXITIES

A few weeks ago there was a hiccup on the internet and it's connectivity. In simple terms it was a configuration error that Verizon did. Too bad it wasn't ComCast! In the past I warned about what misconfigurations could do and their consequences. This was only a small taste of what could happen. Luckily it wasn't too severe and short lived.

As all of you know the internet is a network with smaller networks contained within. For packets to flow and reach their destinations a routing table has to be created. There are iron clad routers that exist on the internet and their sole purpose is to route information. They contain the global routing tables. The tables themselves have begun to grow in size and are now affecting the software configuration limits on those routers. Verizon made adjustments to their network and those changes were propagates out. The routing tables were al-

tered and so connectivity was affected.

There is a limit of how many tables a router can hold. We are at the halfway point. 512 is the current setting. Since the latest hiccup, it's being advised to increase that number to 768. Once this is done we'll be at 75% full. The maximum limit is 1024. When we get there hardware will have to be upgraded. New routers will have to be installed. Remember now this will have to be done globally. IPv4 addresses take up 1 slot on those tables. While IPv6, they take up 2 slots.

Since we've pretty much ran out of IPv4 addresses, from here on out it's strictly IPv6 address space growth.



Which means those slots are going to get depleted much faster.

These same routers and their tables can be changed to affect traffic flow. As you remember in

past years and today that countries internet were falling off the grid. Well, the government and

political landscape demanded that traffic be suppressed. We'll start to see more and more of

this behavior. The suppressed citizens fell back to using dialup modems to disseminate their

information.



Greetings fellow Region One members!

I think that much of the region is aware of the discussion that took place a few weeks ago, which dealt with splitting the region. While there was a good deal of disagreement, that post was one of the most responded to ever, at least as far as the R1 Facebook group goes. We had nearly 300 replies. Couple this with the recent R1 RC election, in which there was much discussion about the direction that the region should take in the future, and we have an opportunity to do something for the good of the region.

With that in mind, I have been given the temporary commission by the RC, Ruth Lane, to begin a discussion about what issues need improvement in R1 and come up with solutions for them. Matthew Miller will be joining me in this endeavor since he has already started a survey and has had a good deal of contact with the region's unassigned members as the R1 Recruiting Director.

What I have in mind is that on the Facebook Group, on the email lists or privately, we are going to open it up to take suggestions to improve on R1. However, when you make a suggestion, please be prepared to help work on the solution. You may suggest that we need a fresher website, for example. You may not know how to write

html code or create a website, but you can help by saying "we need starships flying by" or "it needs to be easy to navigate". Some ideas may take a team to implement or even to find an amicable solution, so we need for the region as a whole to be a part of everything we do.

The timeline for this project will be starting immediately by replying to this posting via Facebook or email, either public or in private. We'll gather suggestions until early-mid October, seeking out your ideas for solutions as we go along and then sometime in late October we will assemble teams as needed to tackle those problems that we are going to pursue. Hopefully we can be finished with plans by the end of the year and implement things as soon as possible.

One road we are NOT going to go down is the path of personal attacks. To be quite frank, I don't care how X did it when they were in charge and that Y doesn't do it that way now. Arguing and disagreements will solve nothing and get us nowhere. We are Region One and WE ARE BETTER THAN THAT. Oh, and we've already had our splitting the region discussion for this half-decade, so we don't need to go there again.

The RC and VRCs will be involved as will any affected program directors or staff members, and of course the final say in whether we tackle a problem or not rests with the RC, as it should.

What I am asking for 1000 people to do is to adopt the attitude that I see every year at summit- that of cooperation and fellowship. Impossible? Not in my mind. We'll be calling this effort "Project Make It So", because together we CAN make R1 better. We can make it so.

There is a Region One Counselors Facebook page and a yahoo group region one Counselors.



Region One Sciences is here to provide a resource to R/I ships and other interested members to learn about science through ship science department activities and have fun while you're at it! R/I Chief Science Officers are also requested to send me a monthly summary of your science activities, discoveries of science news items, and science-related things you discuss, so that I receive them by around the 7th of each month. One of the things I like to do is summarize science activities aboard R/I ships' science departments for my monthly reports to RDC Program Director, BGN Rey Cordero. It's great to see what science activities the region's ships are doing! But before I begin, I

wanted to mention that we are working through Starfleet Sciences to see if NASA is interested in pairing with STARFLEET to promote NASA programs and space exploration and education in general. Also, two crew members of the USS Alaric, Jennifer Hampton (with assistance from Ken Wheeler), are working with schools, museums, and others in the Asheville, NC area to promote science education among children. Lessons learned locally here through the Alaric's (Jennifer's) efforts will be provided for application across Region One and STARFLEET.

Following are excerpts from my April through August RDC reports to BGN Cordero:

Region One Summit: As R/I Science RDC, I presented Region One Sciences annual CSO awards at the Region One Summit to FCapt. Janet Wagoner (USS Ohio), Comm. Janice Graham (USS Renegade), Capt. Nancy Hall (USS Jurassic), and Capt. Lea Relyea (USS Alaric); both Janet and Janice reported 12 months out of 12 in 2013. As USS Alaric CO, I ran gaming with FCapt. Stephen Stott (XO USS Ronald E. McNair) (who provided Star Trek Attack Wing demo) and Lt. Emilee Dockery (USS Indiana) (who brought MB's Sub Search, MB's Electronic Battleship: Advanced Mission, Star Trek: The Game, and Battlestar Gallactica).

My Region One Sciences ARDC (Assistant Regional Division Chief) for many years, Brigadier Dennis Relyea, passed away in June after a heroic fight against cancer. Our thoughts and hearts go out to him and Lea, his wife. With his passing, we have suffered a great loss. I posted to several regional and STARFLEET lists an email soliciting applicants for the position of ARDC:

With the passing of Brigadier Dennis Relyea, the position of Assistant Regional Division Chief (ARDC) for Sciences in Region One is now open. I will be accepting applications until September 26, 2014. Please submit

your application to RDC Richard Heim, P.O. Box 2072, Asheville, NC 28802 or via email to me at AlaricRH@charter.net. With your application, please include your STARFLEET resume, your real-life resume, and a paragraph explaining why you want the position and what you would like to accomplish as Region One Sciences ARDC. You don't need to be a Science Officer aboard your ship to qualify, although that would help, but you do need to be a STARFLEET Region One member. I'm looking forward to hearing from you!

Duties: To serve as a representative for the R/I Science RDC at events and meetings the RDC is not able to attend. Provide valuable consultation and advice to the RDC, as needed. To lead various projects, such as the compilation of scientific and technological applications and developments presaged in the Star Trek TV shows, and helping keep the Region One Sciences web pages up-to-date and current, and others as requested. Additional duties may be determined pending the applicant's response to the request to include "a paragraph explaining why you want the position and what you would like to accomplish as Region One Sciences ARDC".

Lt. Sherriea Williams, of the science vessel USS Tycho, initiated contact with NASA project director, Sarah Ramsey, who expressed interest in exploring a relationship with STARFLEET to promote NASA programs and science education. RDC Science Director Richard Heim, as Starfleet Sciences Director, is following up with Ms. Ramsey. (May): Lt. Williams continued conversations with Dr. Ramsey, who expressed interest in exploring a relationship with STARFLEET to promote NASA programs and science education. Sherriea noted that the NASA program seeks to "encourage non-government and non-military people to become active in sharing ideas that we the general public have to assist the space program. Many of her contests have cash awards, for those members interested

in real challenges.” In Sherriea’s discussions with Dr. Ramsey, the following ideas have been suggested: “ask our (STARFLEET) ships in all regions to initiate contests challenging all crews to solve living in space problems. The winners would receive certificates from her NASA office. Better ideas on any topic are much welcomed – from robots and asteroid observations -- to better methods for eating, bathing and bathroom technologies ... these are a few problems that come to mind.” I (Richard Heim) think this is an excellent idea and seek input from ships across Region One (and across STARFLEET). (July): Sherriea provided information about the NASA CubeSats project. The CubeSat Launch initiative (CSLI) provides opportunities for small satellite payloads to fly on rockets planned for upcoming launches. The CubeSats are flown as auxiliary payloads on previously planned missions.

Adm. Willy Smith, Chief Science Officer of the USS Heimdal, reported that the April meeting was the ship’s 30th Anniversary Celebration held at The Lounge in the Holiday Inn Downtown Lynchburg, Virginia. 64 people attended the buffet dinner, evening of videos & dancing to the Rain Stealers Band. Guests were greeted by a life-size Guardian of Forever, complete with blinking / fading lights, & had their photos taken in front of it or in some cases actually leaping through it. Each guest also received a gift bag filled with goofy stuff that brought the house down. Following dinner Willy Smith & Karen Delano gave a Video Presentation, which included a 30 Year Heimdal Retrospective followed by last year’s Anniversary Video & this year’s anniversary video, which has been entered in the Summit Video Contest in May. The videos were a huge hit & trophies were presented to Karen & Willy by newly-promoted Admiral, XO Kenny Proehl, for their hard work & great result on the videos. When guests arrived they were asked to make a guess how many aliens, stars & moons were in a jar. Willy Smith’s sister won the prize guessing just 1 more than was in the jar. 5 other tickets were drawn for door prizes, which were Star Trek mugs from Café

Press. The Heimdal’s recipient of our 2014 Space Camp Scholarship was chosen – a 13 year old girl. All arrangements for her trip in June have been made. Our Space Camp Committee met & read the essay entries on April 5. Adm. Smith reported that at the May meeting, “Our guest speaker was Elizabeth Narehood from Future Focus, a local program that brings science & technology to grades K through 12 with an emphasis on robotics. She gave a presentation of slides & videos featuring Future Focus & robotics. She brought a working robot with her & after her presentation & a Q & A session, she let everyone manipulate the robot around the library meeting room. She had handouts & everyone enjoyed her presentation, especially the ‘hands on’ time with the robot. Hopefully this S.T.E.M. (science, technology, engineering, and math) activity will be in Virginia schools as an elective such as Shop or Home Eco. It will enrich the lives of many kids with science and technology. Fascinating! Check out <http://bit.ly/lw0wz> for a cool video put on by students explaining their work (something each team MUST do).” Willy also reported that, “this past April, the Heimdal had one of its junior members involved in a Lego based project on ways to prepare, stay safe, and rebuild after a disaster (<http://bit.ly/lw0vvp>). 23 members attended this REALLY interesting meeting and Linda will have her on her TV show soon ... so it’s not over yet!” For the July meeting, Willy reported that, “July meeting guest speaker was Dr. Brian Nerrie, Aquaculture Specialist from Virginia State University. He told us all about aquaculture & included how NASA plans to use it on future deep space, extended missions. He brought a Power Point presentation & had a Q & A session following his presentation. Many thanks to Heimdal member, Paul Campbell for contacting Dr. Nerrie to be our meeting speaker.” Admiral Smith also noted that, following the speaker, they had a longer than usual business meeting while they finalized everything for their Annual Charity Auction on August 16. “We will not have an August meeting – the auction will take its place. ...

Members Glenda Blanks & Dennis Henderson will be guests taping the ‘Lynchburg Live’ TV talk show on July 23 discussing the auction, the Heimdal & STARFLEET.” Other activities reported by Willy: “Will be taking our Annual Houseboat Trip on Smith Mountain Lake on July 26 with members, Kathy & Larry Whately. We will be having a Pool Party & Picnic on August 23 just to relax the weekend after the auction. Sixteen Heimdal members spent the July 4th holiday on Timberlake with members Peter & Beth Hopkins. Everyone had a great time at the picnic, swimming, relaxing & watching the fireworks on the lake after dark.”

USS Renegade Chief Science Officer, Commodore Janice Graham, reported that “I will be participating in Earth Fest 2014 at Penn State Shenango in Sharon, PA on April 12th. It’s free to the public, lots of activities and Earth-friendly information. I will have only natural fiber to spin and things made with natural fibers such as cotton and wool, and will be doing a hand-spinning demonstration.” In May, Comm. Graham reported that she participated in Earth Fest 2014 at Penn State Shenango in Sharon, PA on April 12th. Janice added that “the Renegade is honored to add Dr. Michio Kaku to our roster as an Honorary Member.” Comm. Graham reported on a website (<http://www.lumosity.com/>) that has scientifically designed tests (disguised as games) that exercise your brain. She heard about it on TV, “and I tried it last night. It’s fun and challenging.” (July): Janice wrote a tribute to the late Dennis Relyea, who served as Alaric CSO and R/I Sciences ARDC for many years. The tribute was a fictional episode of the Alien Ambassador Corps in which she wrote his character’s passing as a hero.

FCapt. Janet Wagoner, CSO of the USS Ohio, related that “this winter has not been kind on our ship’s meeting and activities. We did brave the cold/wind in downtown Akron for the St Patrick’s Day Parade. Afterwards, we had lunch at The Ido. At our last

Nancy took one class from the Academy called PSS-102 Emergency Preparedness 2: Natural Disasters from the College of Survival Studies and passed with Distinction. However, Lt. Annette Wood went on shore leave in April and has the following report: “I went on shore leave to San Francisco and San Diego CA to visit family. While there we drove across the Golden Gate Bridge, scenes to many adventures in the Star Trek universe including Star Trek IV: The Voyage home where Admiral James T. It was a nice day and the picnic was potluck with hamburgers and brats as the main meal. Carol is looking forward to the end of the Academy year and Diane was back at the Academy giving a workshop to educators on Model Teaching which involves teaching engineering and science instruction modeling for 5th grade teachers. Bruni used her skill as a Botanist to help Nancy with planting new shrubs in her garden and make sure there was mulch there to stop the weeds. Phil and Tracie are looking at dates for members of the Science Department to have an away mission to see the Cleveland Indians Game. Nancy is slowly updating the Jurassic site with updates suggested by the skipper.” (July): Capt. Hall reported on shore leave activities of Science Department members (visiting family). One shore leave included Nancy and Carol, who went to Florida to visit family and, while there, visited the historical city of St. Augustine, the oldest settlement in the United States. Nancy received a grade of Honors in the Vulcan Academy of Science course VAS 104 - Specialist I in Musicology. (August): Nancy reported on activities of Science Department members: “Cadet Carol earned her technician class amateur radio callsign. Her call is

KD8ZEH. Annette is hoping to upgrade her license so has started studying for the general exam. Annette, Bruni, Carol and Nancy went to a Lake Erie Crushers baseball game and had a lot of fun. Annette continues to cut coupons with her friend Eva. Phil and Nancy attended the monthly NASA Glenn Tabletop board gaming event and played several new games.”

Aboard the USS Alaric, Fortean Research Dept. Chief, Capt. Lea Relyea, reported on the condition of husband Dennis Relyea, the Alaric’s CSO. Even struggling with cancer, Brig-Gen. Relyea was able to complete and receive his Woodbadge Beads, an 18-month feat that he finished in less than a year. Lea noted that “the cancer has spread into his lungs now; he is doing palliative chemo which he is handling well.” As reported by Planetary Sciences Dept. Chief, VAdm. Richard Heim, the Alaric held a movie night on March 22 at which the crew watched Shaun of the Dead and Hot Fuzz. The March 15 regular monthly meeting of the U.S.S. Alaric was held at the South Buncombe Branch Library meeting room. The meeting began with regular officer reports and reports on the Alaric’s new SFA Education Department, and continued with discussion of upcoming activities, including the Alaric recruiting tables at the May 10 Space Day event at Roper Mountain Science Center and the June 7-8 GeekOut mini-convention in Asheville (volunteers to man the tables were solicited); support of a July 26 MSG run was also discussed. Science education reports included: the ISS testing of new robots that function in gravity and non-gravity environments, 24-hour cars racing hybrid, and the U.S. House of Representatives wants NASA to conduct a Mars flyby mission in 2021. The Fandom Report discussed the upcoming Star Trek 3 movie and speculation on the future of SF TV shows Almost Human, Intelligence, and Marvel’s Agents of S.H.I.E.L.D. The April 12 regular monthly meeting was combined with the Alaric’s Over 40 Party (to celebrate the ship recently breaking the threshold of having 40 members) and a mod-

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el rocket launch of the Saturn Rocketry Club. The meeting was held at the residence of a Saturn Rocketry Club member and included an outdoor picnic. At the business meeting, regular officer reports were made, status of club projects was discussed, and the Alaric Council voted to upgrade the ship to a Prometheus Class Multi-Vector Advanced Escort. Science education reports included: 1) the recent discovery of a massive meteor impact 3.26 billion years ago, larger than the dinosaur-killing Chicxulub meteor (probably a Rhode-Island-size meteor), which created a crater 300 miles across, and 2) online scanning and skimming rewires peoples' brains to the point where it is hard for them to read comprehensively ("It's like your eyes are passing over the words but you're not taking in what they say," Claire Handscombe confessed. Humans, warn cognitive neuroscientists, seem to be developing digital brains with new circuits for skimming through the torrent of information online; this alternative way of reading is competing with traditional deep reading circuitry developed over several millennia.). A staff meeting was held April 19 during which upcoming projects and activities were discussed. The Alaric had a recruiting table at the Roper Mountain Science Center's May 10 Space Day event. Six members participated, with several of us able to talk one-on-one with the guest speaker, NASA Ambassador Alan Rich, and meteorite collector Mike Parker (who shared his meteorite collection with attendees). Alan's powerpoint presentation, "Eyes on Exoplanets", was especially fascinating! This is the third year the RMSC has asked us to set up a recruiting table at their Space Day event. The USS Alaric lost her CSO, Brigadier Dennis Relyea, to cancer in early June. CO Richard Heim is now serving as CSO. The Alaric sent a contingent to the Region One Summit May 16-18 in Pigeon Forge, TN, where the ship ran Summit gaming with assistance from two other ships. The May 24 regular monthly meeting of the USS Alaric was held at the South Buncombe Branch Library meeting room. The meeting began with regular officer reports and discussion of upcoming activities. It was proposed that

the USS Alaric handbook be revised to reflect that one promotion point will be awarded for every three items brought in for donation to one of the Alaric charities and that the number of points possible to earn will be unlimited; the proposal passed unanimously. The science education report included discussion of the new Martian probe, Insight, to be launched in 2016, the "Qualcomm Tricorder X Prize" contest, and solar roadways. Insight will be stationary and pierce the surface to investigate how Earth-like planets develop their layered inner structure of core, mantle and crust. The \$10 million "Qualcomm Tricorder X Prize" contest is to develop a medical tricorder that can monitor, at a minimum, these medical problems: anemia, type 2 diabetes, pneumonia, TB and the early signs of stroke. Videos and pictures from the Space Day event and from the Region One Summit were also shared, and upcoming fandom news was reported. A movie night was held May 24 after the regular monthly meeting; the movies seen included The World's End and Hunger Games/Catching Fire. The Alaric had a recruiting table at the local Geek Out convention June 7-8. The USS Alaric held a movie night June 14 which was part 4 of the 2000s SF TV theme, with episodes of Smallville (X-Ray), Crusade (The Well of Forever), Eureka (Maneater), and Star Trek Enterprise (In a Mirror Darkly, Parts 1 & 2) shown. The June 21 regular monthly meeting was held at the South Buncombe Branch Library meeting room. The meeting began with regular officer reports and discussion of upcoming activities. The science education report included discussion of the upcoming December test of NASA's Orion spacecraft and the proposed Europa Clipper Mission to determine the potential habitability of the Jupiter ocean moon. After the monthly meeting several members engaged in a game of tennis at a nearby tennis court. Another movie night was held July 5, with Independence Day, Demolition Man, and the Lolani episode of Star Trek Continues shown; an awesome fireworks extravaganza capped the evening! The Alaric had an away mission to the Pink Beds Picnic and Hiking

area on July 13. The July 19 regular monthly meeting was held at the South Buncombe Branch Library meeting room. Prior to the business meeting, a photographer from Bold Life Magazine snapped pictures of Alaric crew in uniform for an article on the club, which will be printed later this summer. The business meeting began with regular officer reports and discussion of upcoming activities. The science education report included discussion of the Rosetta probe and testimony about the future of space exploration. From Ken: The Rosetta probe took pictures of Comet 67P/Churyumov-Gerasimenko on July 14. Ken shared pictures of the comet, which is made of two pieces. There is speculation on how two-piece (contact binary) comets form. Observation of Comet 67P could help scientists understand the formation of contact binary comets. Rosetta will rendezvous with the comet on August 6 and remain to observe until November. Richard shared an article from the June 3 EOS magazine about testimony given to Congress about the future of space exploration and the possibility of discovery of life both in our solar system and in the larger universe. The meeting concluded with a lively discussion of various SF movies and TV shows, including JMS's aborted plans to remake The Forbidden Planet as a trilogy (I feel like it would have been a masterpiece!). The Alaric held a movie night August 9. The theme was 1950s science-fiction movies and TV, with two movies (The Forbidden Planet and War of the Worlds) and four TV episodes (Here Comes Tobor: Tobor and the Atomic Submarine, Radar Men From the Moon: Moon Rocket, One Step Beyond: The Sorcerer, and The Adventures of Rocky and Bullwinkle and Friends: Jet Fuel Formula) shown. Following the shows was a discussion of 1950s culture and cinematic technology and how they differ from today.



GIVING STARFLEET THE BIRD

Well....not quite....but here is a snippet from an article I plan to submit to the CQ's next issue....it may be a great place to start....or even continue....

At this year's International Conference in Rockford, Illinois, I was reminded that when an idea strikes, STARFLEET usually makes it work – especially when charity is involved.

Any charity exists only as long as there are donations supporting it. STARFLEET's primary and self-created charity, the STARFLEET Scholarship Fund, is no different. It, and the students that it supports, are one of our greatest legacies. While sitting with friends on the Friday of the International Conference celebrating STARFLEET's 40th year, I envisioned a way that all members and chapters could potentially raise money to keep our scholarships active and healthy. It all hinged on the smallest, most insignificant, of things – pennies.

We all have pennies. They're, at best, the major component of any person's 'change jar.' You know what I'm talking about – that old jar, cup, bowl, where you dump spare change. And even in the electronic money age – we ALL have change. But what if we could turn that change into a positive change – a contribution to the STARFLEET Scholarship Fund?

It is probably more fortuitous that it is currently school supply shopping season. So, here I am, with a few willing volunteers (we all know who they are) scouring Wal-Mart for the props needed to make this idea a reality. Six pencil boxes, some stickers for decoration, a clear plastic tub in the shape of a bear filled with animal cookies, and a pink owl piggy bank later – a fundraiser was created. Now it just had to be tested.

Thanks to the graciousness of the hosts of the 2014 International Conference and our own Commander, STARFLEET, the idea was given an introduction at General Session. The concept was simple. The pencil boxes would be placed in each

of the panel rooms for people to throw their spare change into. At closing ceremonies the change would be counted. 100% of the money collected would go to the STARFLEET Scholarship Fund. Easy.

I didn't even make it back to my seat at General Session before the change started coming in. Throughout the panels on Saturday afternoon, a lovely assistant, Commodore Michelle Westfall of the ISS Katana (R12), checked from room to room on small pink pencil boxes since I was pinch hitting as AV guru for 3 panels. Were there pennies? Yes. But there was more. Nickels, dimes, quarters and even dollar bills began to fill the boxes. What's more, while walk-



ing around the IC carrying the newly introduced pink owl piggy bank, now named 'Penny', members of STARFLEET began putting in fives, tens, and to my complete surprise, twenties. I was stunned. But that wasn't all. While taking a break outside the hotel with 'Penny', I was approached by total non-STARFLEET strangers who naturally asked what a grown man (6'3" and north of 240) was doing carrying a pink owl piggy bank. I told them we were raising money for a scholarship program, and do

you know what happened? Total strangers pulled change from their pockets to "feed Penny."

At the end of the panels, what had been collected was tallied. In just a few short hours we already had almost \$60 for the

STARFLEET Scholarship Fund; and 'Penny' was just getting started. While sitting on our table at the Admiral's Banquet she got filled even more. Everything from pennies to twenties went in. It was incredible! And that's one of the things I have always loved most about STARFLEET. Give the members of this organization a chance, and they will make miracles happen.

The next morning at Closing Session, 'Lane' joined the party. The giant plastic bear now empty of its animal crackers, became the tally jar for the donations. While 'Penny' made a final 'flight' around the room of Closing Session, all of the pencil boxes were emptied one by one into 'Lane.' Then, 'Penny' was also emptied of everything that had been collected. Thanks again to Michael Garcia, our Vice Chief of Communications, for taking the bear around the room to get a few more donations before the counting started.

At the end of General Session, there was a total. \$202.91, of which there were 331 pennies, had been collected. Pennies. That's where it started, but it wasn't done. During the whole thing, two STARFLEET chapters, Retribution Station (R3) and ISS Katana (R12), had pledged to match whatever 'Penny' had collected. So, in a little over 24 hours at the 2014 International Conference, an idea that started while sitting with some of my fellow STARFLEET members, resulted in a total of \$608.73 being raised for the STARFLEET Scholarship Fund.

'Penny' and I are on our way home, very happy knowing that 'feeding Penny' isn't over – it's only the beginning. She's spawned a movement....she's inspired conversation....she's created ideas....some powerful things....from the smallest seeds... Please... STARFLEET... Let's keep Penny flying high... And let's keep our scholarships soaring...
