

Robert Picardo Visits DC, Unites Fans in Regions One and Seven By CPT Hayden Segel

On July 16th, the USS Potomac was given a rare opportunity to host an autograph signing and meet & greet session with Robert Picardo, the actor best known by Star Trek Fans for his portrayal of "The Doctor" on Star Trek: Voyager. There were many key players responsible for the success of this event both within STARFLEET's Regions One and Seven and outside of STARFLEET as well.

Just two weeks before the event took place, the Crew of the USS Susquehannok, a Region Seven chapter from York, PA hosted a successful meet and greet of their own with the actor in Mechanicsberg, PA. Robert Picardo, the Philadelphia native who had been starring in a production of the Neil Simon play "The Sunshine Boys" at the Totem Pole Playhouse near Gettysburg, PA had expressed an interest in meeting fans in the Washington DC metro area. In response, the Susquehannok put the word out to several Region Seven chapters in the area surrounding Baltimore, MD and Washington, DC. Notices such as these customarily include Region One's USS Potomac in Alexandria, VA.

Once the Potomac received word. they quickly volunteered to host such an event. The crew went right to work; finding a venue, securing transportation, and advertising for the event. The USS Potomac's XO. Lt. Commander David Maxwell, volunteered to personally handle transportation. The next order of business was to find a venue for the event. This task was handled by the USS Potomac's CO, Captain Hayden Segel. The search for a venue led to the discovery of Fantom Comics, a comic book store located within historic Union Station in Washington, DC. Fantom Comics was quickly deemed to be the leading venue for having direct access to the Metro, DC's subway train system. Metro access is crucial as many DC area Sci-Fi fans have

been known to base their decision to attend an event on proximity and access to the metro system. The enthusiastic response from the staff at Fantom Comics alone would have won them the opportunity to be the venue but having a store with metro access,

especially within Union Station certainly singled them out as the ideal choice.

The day's event began with Commander Maxwell driving from Aleaxndria, VA to Fayetteville, PA, a two hour drive, to meet the actor. David was given a complimentary ticket to that day's performance of "The Sunshine Boys" and shortly after the show, he and Mr. Picardo braved the Capital Beltway traffic to make the drive in to Washington, DC for 6:30pm event start time.

Upon arrival, Mr. Picardo was greeted at main entrance to Union Station by Captain Segel. Mr. Picardo was then escorted though the Main Hall to the storefront where he received a resounding ovation by the sizable crowd who assembled, some hours prior, to meet the Actor.

Mr. Picardo was extremely gracious, taking the time to personally engage with each and every fan. He answered questions and shared an-

ecdotes, all the while posing for pictures and signing personalized autographs.

The event concluded with Mr. Picardo thanking the staff of Fantom Comics and the officers of the USS Poto-

mac for all their hard work and dedication. He then posed for a group photo with members of both. The event also left an astounding number of Mr. Picardo's fans with the memories and memorabilia of an experience they won't soon forget.

Finally, Mr. Picardo was taken from Union Station to Dulles International Airport in Chantilly, VA. There, he parted ways with the officers of the USS Potomac to begin the leg of a journey in the life of an extremely busy, working actor.

All in all, the event went extremely well. The overwhelming success of this event was a direct result of a lot of effort from and precision coordination between all the parties involved. In the end, not only was the crew of the USS Potomac left with the satisfaction of putting together an event that united fans across regional boundaries, but left them very eager to take on the project that comes their way with determination and enthusiasm.

Chief Communications, STARFLEET By COM Liz Woolf

As of yesterday, July 15, 2013, the nomination period for the 2013 Commander, STARFLEET election has officially ended.

The following two STARFLEET members have each received enough valid nominations to officially announce their intention to run for Commander, STARFLEET in 2013:

Fleet Admiral Les Rickard USS Charon, Region 1 33 nominations

Admiral Wayne Lee Killough, Jr. USS Retribution, Region 3 32 nominations

Other members who received nominations were:

Commodore Michael Timko of the USS Lagrange in Region 1 received 4 nominations.

Fleet Captain Rich Jolitz of the USS Tang in Region 15 received 1 nomination.

Because they did not receive the required minimum of 5 valid nominations, they are not eligible to run for Commander, STARFLEET in this election.

Additionally, the Admiralty Board found that Fleet Captain Jolitz did not meet the eligibility requirements outlined in Section 4.03 of the STAR-FLEET Membership Handbook.

So what happens now?

Both Wayne and Les have ten days until July 26) to separately and officially (accept their nominations and announce their intentions to run for Commander, STARFLEET. That announcement needs to also name an official running mate for Vice-Commander, STARFLEET.

In order for the acceptance announcement to be considered official, the candidate needs to email a copy to comms@sfi.org (and it is recommended to copy the Inspector General as well at ig@sfi.org). The candidate is welcome to post his acceptance announcement on whatever STARFLEET lists he wants to, but a direct email still needs to be sent to me as the Election Coordinator in order to be counted. Failure to do so within ten days of this announcement will constitute a declining of the nomination.

Election packets with ballots will be mailed out in early September to all members who are active as of August 1, 2013. Voting continues through November 15. More on this in later updates.

Who placed a nomination?

70 nominations were received, from 65 chapters COs and 4 RCs. I believe this marks the first election where every nomination was submitted electronically (last time 'round there was one long mail-in nomination).



Hello everyone. For this issue, I wanted to take a moment and talk about something that's been (indirectly) on the Starfleet Election List recently (don't worry folks, I promise not to get political here).

During the discussions on the Election Lists, often the subjects of "What more can HQ do for the membership or chapters in such and such area?" or "What will you, the prospective Commander, STARFLEET, do to make sure such and such is provided to the paying membership?" come up. These questions, in one form or another, were asked of all the candidates and on various topics. Some discussion has been on memberships in 'fleet and the form (paper, electronic or a hybrid of the two) that they should take; some on the Communigué and its form and how HQ can save money and get it out to the members on a timely basis. Another tack that the discussions have taken of late has been on programs/offices/ departments that HQ has or offers to serve or support the membership and how they could be combined and/or eliminated. Each of these, and the other points brought up in the discussions on the list, are all valid and do need serious thought and debate. These issues should be considered and, hopefully, responsible decisions made that would benefit the organization as a whole.

The reason that I bring up all of

these points is because, at their heart, they have a commonality; a sense, or assumption, that STAR-FLEET is a "top-down" association. Another way of putting this would be that there is a belief that STARFLEET operates like a large service corporation... you pay a "fee" and it, STAR-FLEET, provides services in return for your money. Well, this is and isn't true. As a STARFLEET member, it is true that your dues entitle you to the materials in your membership packet and a regular subscription to the Communiqué. These are the "tangibles" that we get through our membership every year. The remainder is the "access to the community" that membership provides us. In much the same way as belonging to a fraternal organization does, membership in STARFLEET opens up networks and associations of people where the like minded can find ways to interact and enjoy activities together within a common setting. Every program that STARFLEET has that comes from "HQ" is, in actuality, a group of like minded volunteers that have agreed to work together to provide a "service". The Academy, the Communiqué staff, Starfleet Marines, the Holodeck Program and so forth are all groups of individuals that are dedicated to give of their own time and labor to make something their fellow members can enjoy. This isn't something that HQ, the Executive Committee or Admiralty Board can just provide the membership at large. They couldn't if they had to, not effectively at least. HQ and the leadership provide a structure... a framework with a bit of oversight...that makes all of what STARFLEET is (programs, chapters and services) hang together. But they do not "give" these things to the membership. The truth is: the members make STARFLEET work!

Not a single person on the international or regional administration levels is a "one man (or woman) band"; everything that happens in 'fleet is, ultimately, a group effort.

The main point of all of this is all rather simple. If you, as a member, see something that you think STAR-FLEET could be doing better or is not doing, make your voice heard or, even better ,volunteer! For STAR-FLEET to work well and to grow into the future, individual members need to be willing to step forward and get involved. You can volunteer by working with the Academy to create new courses or schools, or with the Communiqué as a copy editor. Every service or program on the Fleet or Regional levels could always benefit from an extra set of hands. I think we'd be hard pressed to find a program director at any level that would turn down an offer to help (I'm sure that our very own Region One Program Directors would love to fill in some gaps in their staffs <hint, hint>).

It's been said in recent discussions that "STARFLEET is its Members". Some may think that this is a little trite, and I've been accused of being more than a bit cynical in my day (so I can spot trite a mile away), but I can't think of a more apt description for our organization. "STARFLEET is its Members" is, in every conceivable sense, absolutely true. The membership, not HQ, makes STARFLEET what it is. The membership makes it what it wants STARFLEET to be. I'd like to challenge every STARFLEET member to get as involved as they possibly can. It's rewarding, you can make a difference and you can make STARFLEET a better organization for everyone. To coin a phrase:

Don't ask what STARFLEET can do for you... ask what you can do for STARFEET!

SPACE CAMP® was founded in 1982 as the U.S. Space & Rocket Center® museum's education program to promote the study of math, science, and technology. This educational program couples classroom instruction with hands-on activities and teaches teamwork, decisionmaking, and leadership. Rocket scientist Dr. Wernher von Braun, while leading the team of scientists and engineers at the Marshall Space Flight Center that sent astronauts to the moon, inspired these programs that have challenged and educated youngsters from all 50 states and over 40 countries and territories. SPACE CAMP has become known as one of the premier math/science/ technology educational programs in the United States.

Camps are available for fourth grade through high school-age students. Additional programs are available for trainees who are blind or visually impaired, and for the deaf or hard of hearing. "Space Is Special" is a program for special education students.

SPACE CAMP programs are also available for adults, and special camps have been designed for educators and for corporate groups.

Additional Space Camp Family Programs are available for children as young as 7 years.

More than 600,000 students and adults have attended SPACE CAMP since the program began in June, 1982.

Data from student surveys document the benefits of SPACE CAMP. The USSRC surveyed 9.950 alumni who attended camp between 1987 and 1992, allowing a lapse in time from camp attendance until initiation of the survey to measure whether attending camp had a lasting effect on students. The return rate was approximately 12%, and the results are dramatic: 93% of the alumni said they took more science courses, particularly physics and chemistry, in the years following camp; 91% reported taking more math; and 74% said they learned about careers.

More recent data is available from a SPACE CAMP program for Title I students funded in 2002 by the Marshall Space Flight Center. Nine Title I schools from North Alabama participated. The program, called NASA Stars, trained 18 teachers and 382 students. Assessments reveal that students showed a 21% gain in knowledge and understanding of the scientific process and a 47% gain in the knowledge and understanding of the importance and significance of past, present, and future space exploration.

Are you ready for the most amazing test!? Space Camp trainees put their adventure skills to the test as they train to live and work in space and take command of their own simulated space missions!

SPACE CAMP® is the adventure of a lifetime! Space Camp encourages trainees to pursue more science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) through exciting hands-on educational activities. The facility is located on the grounds of the U.S. Space & Rocket Center® which is also the official visitor center for NASA's Marshall Space Flight Center.

During the five-night program, trainees participate in two 1-hour simulated shuttle missions. Students in mission control will monitor the progress and safety of the mission, those in the shuttle will successfully launch and land the spacecraft, and those in the space station will conduct science experiments while learning basic scientific principles.

Crew trainers will guide trainees through the past, present and future of space exploration using actual rockets and shuttles as the backdrop. R/1 Chief Science Officers are requested to send me a monthly summary of your science activities, discoveries of science news items, and science-related things you discuss, so that I receive them by around the 7th of each month. And I always want to take the opportunity to mention the Holodeck Science Program. I'm director (CO) of this 'fleet-wide program with a web site at

which provides links for real-world science resources, such as science web pages, educational materials, pictures, and science museums, as well as links to science activities occurring within STARFLEET. We have a Science-Lab listserver where science

news and discussions are posted as well as a Facebook page (https://www.facebook.com/pages/Starfleet-Sciences/365693010206326) which serves a similar function.

Paul Dyl recently drafted a revised Region One Sciences logo for the department. The following are the two possibilities I like the best. Which one (left or right) do you think I should adopt?





One of the things I like to do is summarize science activities aboard R/1 ships' science departments for my monthly reports to RDC Program Director, Fleet Captain Remaly. It's great to see what science activities the region's ships are doing! Following are excerpts from some recent reports:

Captain Janet Wagoner reported on the USS Ohio's very busy May: "After going to the Region 1 Summit, we spent 3 days recruiting at the Lake 8 Movies. We viewed the new Star Trek movie and also Ironman. An away team went to the Cherry Blossom Festival on May 19. The ship had a cook out and watched the fireworks at the Kenmore Community Days on May 26. We donated pop taps and cleaning supplies to the Akron Ronald McDonald House." In June, the USS Ohio decorated a display case at the library with Star Trek collectibles and info of their ship. The display was there for the month of June. Janet adds, "It's a great way

to recruit!" I (Richard Heim) should add that the local Asheville libraries asked us (the USS Alaric) to do the same thing in the 1990s—indeed, it is a good way to recruit!

Ensign Kattie Staples discussed activities of the Science Department aboard the USS Pawlowski. "Our key activities have been working on a new Science Logo," Kattie reported. "Also, we made a few minor fixes to the department section of our chapter membership handbook. The last item is that I am working on a very small department newsletter to put out inbetween the time of the chapter newsletter. I hope that the first issue could be out in August 2013."

USS Renegade CSO Comm. Janice Graham reported on her receipt of the 2012 Albert Einstein Award at the Region 1 Summit. Janice also noted that, at the Summit, "I helped with the registration table, the webcast (just kept an eye on things for Warren), and donated the use of paper plates for the auction. Also participated in the Klingon Karaoke. Planning to take some Academy courses soon."

The chief of the combined Computer Ops/Science Department aboard the USS Jurassic, Captain Nancy Hall, provided an updated roster of Science Department personnel and their positions: Nancy R. Hall - Chief Science Officer, Dawn Jenkins -Planetary Scientist, Annette Wood -Stellar Cartography, Bruni Quinones - Botanist, Phil Stehno - Science Survey team member for away mission, Tracie Stehno - Science Survey team member for away mission, Diane McElwain - Transporter science personnel, Cadet Carol Hall - Junior scientist. Nancy elaborated on their roles: "The members of the science department onboard the USS Jurassic specializes in scientific research. Nancy leads the department as CSO with several personnel below her. Since not everyone on the ship may be aware of all the roles within the science department, I have provided quick summary. Dawn as Planetary Scientist studies celestial bodies,

such as planets, planetoid, asteroids and moons. Annette in Stellar Cartography is responsible for science and practice of making maps and projections of any new regions of space we discover or explore. Bruni is the ship's Botanist and catalogs and studies plant life. She also has plants available to the crew if they want to have them in their crew quarters and she wants to know before you bring any plant-life onboard. We don't want a repeat of the episode where a crew member, Seymour, brought in a plant that it turns out feeds on human blood and flesh which made the plant grow rapidly in size. The plant overtook 2 crew quarters before it could be contained. Luckily we didn't lose any crew members. Phil and Tracie are part of the science survey crew. They help coordinate and plan away missions and are the guide for the away mission. Right now they are planning an away mission to the Planet Zoolanda (aka the Cleveland Metroparks Zoo) and to a Cleveland Indians Game, where we will learn more about a old Earth pasttime called baseball. Diane is a transporter science personnel and assists the transporter chief and transporter engineer. Finally, Cadet Carol is a junior scientist in our department. She is learning about the different roles of personnel in the science department. While she has an interest in Chemistry, she hasn't decided yet which area to specialize in. So she is learning on the ship while still taking classes at the Academy." She added, "I will have another opportunity to ride on the reduced gravity aircraft in both July and Sept for an experiment that I am involved with at work. The reduced gravity aircraft flies in a parabolic pattern, think of roller coaster hills going up and down and during the freefall portion of the flight, everyone on board get to freefall or float for 20 seconds while we conduct experiments. I have been getting the experiments ready and will be testing it in the coming months. Congrats to Cadet Carol Hall who earned the Cadet of the year annual award!" From the April report, Capt. Hall noted that Phil will plan a trip to the Cleveland Zoo to see the

dinosaur exhibits ("this will become our away mission to the planet Zoolanda that members of Computer Ops visited several years ago") and Diane will organize a Star Party at her home around the time of the Perseid Meteor Shower on Aug 10. Nancy described several away missions by department personnel in her June report: "Nancy and Carol went on a 4 day Royal Caribbean Cruise June 14-17 to the Bahamas and visited Nassau and Coco Cay (this island is owned by Royal Caribbean). It was fun to learn about another country and its culture. On June 27, Cadet Carol Hall visited the International Women's Air and Space Museum in Cleveland as part of her Girl Scout camp program. She enjoyed the visit and learned about women's role in aviation. ... the Cleveland Zoo Trip to the see the Dinosaur exhibit had to be canceled this month. We will try to reschedule in July. Dawn saw the International Space Station (ISS) fly over Cleveland as there were several good opportunities. Here is the site to see when ISS will be overhead your

spotthesttion.nasa.gov/sightings. She also saw the planet Mercury when it was visible overhead. As part of Diane's job, she gets to talk to the public and she recently gave a talk to the Portage and Summit County (in Ohio) Rotary club where one of the topics was on the Mars Rover Curiosity. NASA has several rovers on Mars including the Mars Exploration Rover Opportunity who will celebrate her 10th birthday on Mars on July 4th. Annette and Bruni went to the local nursery several times to buy plants to put in their garden and flowerbed. Now that Annette is retired, she is able to spend more time in the garden and with her husband. Their garden is very colorful due to all the great plants around it."

USS Heimdal CSO, Adm. Willy Smith, reported on many recent activities of the ship. Guest speaker at the May meeting was "Tony Camm, local entrepreneur & celebrity. He brought a short film with a science fiction theme that was recently entered in a video contest & talked about the spe-

cial effects. He also talked about his many local community projects. He was a wonderful speaker & followed his presentation with a Q&A session." Seven members attended the R/1 Summit and the Heimdal received many awards, including Regional Chapter of the Year. Heimdal Science Department member Jennifer Whitten was runner up Cadet of the Year – R1. Willy noted that "we discussed our very successful presence at STAR TREK: INTO DARKNESS. The 15 people who helped out at the theater were given DSAs for their participation & XO Kenny Proehl was given a Meritorious Service Award for coordinating our promo & recruiting efforts at the theater with the theater management & the USS Appomattox. The theater gave special raffle tickets to people who brought a canned good for the Heimdal's Salvation Army Food Pantry donation & a pet food for the Appomattox's donation to the Humane Society shelter. Each chapter brought in approximately the same amount of donations & we helped those in need in our community while we were having fun. Our 2013 Space Camp student, Caroline DeChant, will be taking her trip in July. She is our first female recipient since 1999. The trip cost the Heimdal \$1369 with the \$99 flight suit included that was donated by Fleet member, Roy Henderson. The Heimdal has made full payment to Space Camp for Caroline's trip.'

procedure for adopting a chapter mascot. Our science education discussion consisted of reports from Diana on a meteorite (estimated to be 1 foot wide and 88 pounds) that recently struck the Moon, Kristine on a new method for detecting cancer, and Ken on the discovery of a reservoir under Ontario that holds water which is a billion years old. The meeting concluded with a discussion of the first Star Trek novel, Spock Must Die! by James Blish: we covered the novel's discussion of technical issues (scientific knowledge that was current at the time), moral issues (transporting the soul), and characterization. In the June report, Fortean Research Department Chief, Cmdr. Lea Elwood-Relyea, reported that husband Dennis, the USS Alaric's Chief Science Officer, is beginning to heal from his treatment for throat and neck cancer. She noted that caring for BGen. Relyea has consumed much of her time, but added, "The doctors have been impressed at the positive response the cancer has had to treatment." During June, the USS Alaric was invited to have a table at the June 15 Asheville Father's Fest, an event celebrating Father's Day sponsored by Highland

Brewery. Ten Alaric crewmembers, most in Star Trek costumes, wowed the crowd and took to the stage when the entertainer sang a sci-fi-themed song. The group pictures of Star Wars fans (also in costume) with the Alaric crew are priceless! The June 22 regular monthly meeting of the USS Alaric was held Saturday afternoon at the South Buncombe Branch Library meeting room. After regular officer reports were made, we announced that the Alaric's model rocket was successfully launched at the rocket launch event that morning, noted that all three incumbent officers (CO, XO, SO) were running for reelection in the upcoming biennial Alaric officer elections, then discussed several possible activities/away missions to do in the future, including hiking in Brevard, a Star Trek-themed dance (dancing in costume), stargazing at FENC (Foothills Equestrian Nature Center), and away missions to planetariums and science museums. Our science education discussion consisted of reports from Ken (who showed video and pics of the Alaric model rocket launch and discussed the possibility of a paleo subsurface ocean on Saturn's moon Dione and the possible search for life in Eu-

ropa's ocean by a tiny submersible), Kitty (who discussed penny4nasa.com), Tom (who reported on a newly-discovered process for creating steel that emits only pure oxygen, and its application to lunar mining and exploration), Deni (who reviewed a 2010 International Space Station experiment that investigated the human immune system), and Richard (who reported on the Biozoom Biofeedback Scanner, a medical device patterned after Star Trek's medical tricorder that is "the only handheld diagnostic device of its kind worldwide that tests for your health without blood tests or piercing your skin"). After the meeting, Alaric members held a movie night at which they viewed the movie "Predators", the pilot episode of "Fringe", and the Star Trek fan movie "Of Gods and Men." Another movie night was planned for July 6.

Subject: Christopher Scott Parker (Commander Skotek Tr'Kitanriis)

Romulan Reunificationist Background:

Commander Christopher Parker was born in the year 2345 to parents Amanda Michelle Parker, A lieutenant from the late Starship ENTERPRISE C, and Commander Sekos Tr'Kitanriis, a Romulan officer. His mother was killed when Natasha Yar attempted escape and the ENTERPRISE survivors were executed. Parker grew up as Skotek Tr'Kitanriis. Parker's father was one of ambassador Spock's followers.

Parker received formal training at the Romulan academy and was soon appointed to the Tal Shiar. He briefly served aboard the D'Deridex class warbird KOZINAK. The ship that had, several years earlier, led the attack on Khitomer.

When word reached Parker that a group of young Romulan officers were planning to defect to the Federation, Parker leapt at the chance.

The group managed to "acquire" a scout ship and were well on their way when a warbird intercepted them just across the neutral zone. When, two days later, a Federation Starship, the U.S.S. PHOENIX, found the scout, Parker was the only survivor.

What amazed Captain Maxwell and his crew was the remains of a warbird that had been destroyed by disruptor fire. The only explanations that the crew could come up with were farfetched to say the least.

One was that another warbird had come in aid to the scout. That was very unlikely since that would require a full crew of Romulans willing to destroy a fellow warship. The other theory was even more unlikely, though it was the most often believed. Given the strains that had been put on the scout's disruptor coils and engine core, the PHOENIX's chief engineer speculated that it was the scout, through near-legendary maneuvering. that had destroyed the warbird. When asked about it though, Parker merely commented that "it was in the past and that's where it should stay ". He seemed to be in relatively good spirits considering that his wife had also died in the scout ship.

Eventually, Parker made it to earth and enrolled in Starfleet academy under Captain Maxwell's sponsorship. Parker took his mother's name at this time.

He was a stand-out student at the academy. His entrance exam grades were the highest in his class. He was the only cadet in over forty years to reach level eleven on the Kobayashi Maru scenario. He was exceptional in fighter training, constantly shooting down his instructors and thereby earning their respect.

Starfleet career:

Parker's first assignment upon graduation from Starfleet Academy was to the experimental Maxwell Class heavy frigate U.S.S. INTREP-ID. A ship he helped design. While there, he forged a strong loyalty to the CO, Captain Eric W. Larkin. Even more unusual was the friendship borne out of respect with the ship's weapon's officer, Commander Greg Franklin, a Klingon. While on board this ship, he shot to the rank of Lieutenant Commander within two years. When Captain Larkin was removed from command in 2469, Parker requested a transfer. His request was put on hold until nearly a year later

when he was assigned to the recently refitted U.S.S. EXCELSIOR. The very ship that was given to Captain Larkin. While there, He received the rank of Commander. When the ship was taken away from the Captain later that year, Parker went on extended leave. In 2472, he was tracked down by Captain Larkin and Commander Franklin. They asked him to serve with them aboard a new ship. The Sovereign class Starship, U.S.S. RE-PRISAL as Weapons and Tactical Officer. Parker leapt at the chance to serve with his former shipmates, even taking a reduction in rank in order to serve with a crew that has continually impressed him. Parker is currently Chief of Security aboard the U.S.S. REPRISAL, and holds the rank of Senior Commander, pending testing and review for Captain. Parker also holds the rank of Ambassador to the Alien Ambassador Corps, he represents the Unification Movement, the splinter group of Romulans wishing to reunite with their Vulcan cousins. Needless to say, this has made him the target of many assassination attempts, though arguably no more than any other ambassador.

Conclusion

Lately it has been discovered that Parker may not have been a loyal member of the Tal Shi'ar, and may instead have been a member of the Tal Prai'ex, the Romulan Praetorian Guard, the personal forces of the Romulan Emperor. Often the leadership switches back and forth between the Emperor and the Praetor, depending on who is stronger at the time, Romulan politics being what they are, the current ruler is a young praetor named Neral who nearly captured both Ambassador Spock and Captain Jean-Luc Picard several years earlier as Procounsel. The current Emperor is regarded as rather unintelligent and somewhat whimsical, and has therefore not been actively targeted by the Praetors assassins, who prefers to use the weak Emperor as a figurehead for his own schemes. Parker's involvement in the Tal Shi'ar, among other confidential communiques may indicate that the Emperor is not so foolish or so weak as he apparently seems. What this means for the future of the Romulan Empire remains to be seen.



In 1984 the shuttle ASGARD based in Madison Heights, VA & supported by the USS Jamestown as her mother ship was launched. In April 1985 she became the starship USS Heimdal, NCC-1793.

The Heimdal, in her 29 years as a Starfleet chapter has launched 14 shuttles including the first Starfleet chapter to be launched in the state of West Virginia. Her shuttles have gone on to launch shuttles of their own making the Heimdal mother, grandmother & great grandmother of many ships in the Fleet & a fine & prolific old girl.

The Heimdal & her spawn have given R/1 three regional coordinators, numerous Regional Division Chiefs, a Deputy Director of the R/1 Awards Program & one Starfleet ShOC Coordinator.

The Heimdal has won many regional & Starfleet awards including both Region One's & Starfleet's Chapter of the Year, regional & Starfleet CO of the Year, regional & Starfleet Enlisted Member off the Year, regional & Starfleet Officer of the Year & regional & Starfleet Flag Officer of the year. The Heimdal's newsletter has won Newsletter of the Year awards both regionally & at the Starfleet level & most recently won the Region One Video Contest at the 2013 Summit. Her Communications & Security Departments have also held the title of Regional Department of the Year.

During her illustrious 29 year voyage she & her crew have sponsored welfare children & senior citizens at Christmas, supported the Salvation Army Food Pantry, and donated regularly to 2 local Humane Society shelters & one local no-kill cat shelter. She has provided a movie screen for the local library where the chapter meets & also an entire section of science fiction books. Nicknamed 'Bones' by his longtime friend and commander, Captain James T. Kirk, McCoy replaced Mark Piper as chief medical officer in 2266 on one of the ship's five-year missions but clearly became the most renowned. By that first year he had

already won the commendations of Legion of Honor, awards of valor, and was decorated by Starfleet Surgeons. His temperament was sometimes argumentative, a cynic's outer crustiness masking deep caring beneath the surface. His "old South" roots led to the old-time physician manner of doctoring, with a Southern accent that was most apparent when under stress. He distrusts transporter technology and travels by shuttlecraft whenever possible.

McCoy was married once and later divorced, a relationship never discussed except for his one daughter, Joanna, who later graduated from nursing school. In the era before ship's counselors, McCoy played his

role as psychologist expertly to the hilt — especially for the ship's two senior officers. As such an emotional watchdog he was not afraid to take on his captain, but it was his running battle of wits with Spock which became legendary. Spock showed his true feelings, though, as when inviting McCoy down to Vulcan for his "wedding" and in storing his katra with him before a known suicidal saving of their ship before the Genesis detonation.

McCoy contracted the always-fatal xenopolycythemia and retired from Starfleet in 2369 to spend his remaining days on the asteroid ship, Yonada, and that world's high priestess, Natira — whom he soon married. By exploring Yonada's computers, Spock found a cure for xenopolycythemia and McCoy left Natira to return to the service. Earlier, McCoy had been infected with the strange 'aging' virus that infected the Gamma Hydra IV landing party.

After the *U.S.S. Enterprise*'s triumphant return from its five-year mission, McCoy retired from Starfleet, grew a beard and went into virtual seclusion with a rural practice, only to be forced back to duty by Kirk and Admiral Nogura when V'Ger threatened Earth in 2271. After that he continued through the years of renewed

Enterprise service with Kirk until at least the Khitomer peace talks of 2293, having survived imprisonment with him on trumped-up charges at the Rura Penthe mining prison when he could not revive assassinated Klingon Chancellor Gorkon. Spock's deposit of his katra in 2285 had nearly driven him crazy and landed him in Starfleet detention until the refusion took place, whereupon he delighted in the Vulcan's reeducation process. As a retired admiral he remained active in his later years, serving at the age of 137 and shuttling aboard the U.S.S. Enterprise-D in 2364 in his role of inspecting medical facilities on new starships.

McCoy was an active practitioner well before his Starfleet days, of course. In 2253, some 12 years before he signed aboard with Kirk, he had developed a neural grafting procedure employing the creation of axonal pathways between the graft and a subject basal ganglia that was still the practice over a century later. He had also been stationed on Capella for a few months and knew the intricate customs of the Ten Tribes there.







See Three Asteriods in the Night Sky This Month By www.space.com

See Three Asteroids in the Night Sky This Month

Have you ever seen an asteroid?

These space rocks, though small in size, are very numerous, but very few amateur astronomers have ever seen one. The next couple of weeks give stargazers an opportunity to view three asteroids in one night: Flora, Juno, and Iris.

The asteroids Juno, Flora and Iris were among the first eight space rocks ever to be discovered. Juno was the third asteroid discovered, in 1804, very soon after Ceres — the largest asteroid — in 1801 and Pallas in 1802. It was discovered by German astronomer Karl Ludwig Harding, and named after Juno, the highest of the Roman goddesses.

At present Juno is located in the western part of the constellation Aquarius, and is about magnitude +8.6 on the scale used by astronomers to measure brightness of space objects. (The lower the number, the

brighter the object, with negative numbers denoting exceptional brightness.)

Juno is too faint to be seen with the unaided eye, but can be easily seen in binoculars or a small telescope. In amateur telescopes it is too small to look any different than a star, hence the name "asteroid" meaning "starlike."

The first asteroids were discovered quite by accident. In 1846, British astronomer John Russell Hind decided to change that by beginning a systematic effort to search for asteroids using the newly published Berlin starmaps. He plotted objects along the ecliptic, adding stars that were too faint to be on the maps, and looking for any star that seemed to move. He was rewarded the next year by his discovery of two new asteroids, Iris on Aug. 13 and Flora on Oct. 18.

Iris is named after the Greek goddess of the rainbow and Flora after the Roman goddess of flowers. Juno is the largest of the three, 145 miles (233 kilometers) in diameter, and Flora the smallest at 80 miles (128 km), with Iris in between at 125 miles (200 km). As you can see, they are all quite tiny bodies. The asteroid Juno has been photographed by the Hooker Telescope at Mount Wilson, and is a rough potato shape with a very large crater on its surface.

Currently, Iris is in central Aquarius at magnitude 7.6, making it the brightest of the three, and Flora is in Sagittarius at magnitude 8.6. Iris is just south of the globular cluster Messier 2, Juno just north of Messiers 72 and 73, and Flora just west of globular cluster Messier 75.


If you want to replicate the methods used by these early 19th century astronomers, you could plot the "stars" in the neighborhoods indicated on successive nights, and then look for the ones that move. Or you could use the more modern approach of printing finder charts using a modern planetarium program on your computer. All three are moving slowly westward, from left to right for observers in the Northern Hemisphere.

It's really quite remarkable that we can see these tiny chunks of rock, farther away than Mars, with ordinary binoculars. Don't miss this chance.


