In an extremely rare election season event I send this on behalf of myself, Wayne Killough and both of our teams. We want to take a moment to talk about STARFLEET's 40th Anniversary next year.

Celebrating our 40 years as an organization is very important to all of us. STARFLEET has accomplished so much since being born in Texas almost four decades ago. Wayne and I both want to be prepared to celebrate this important anniversary. In order to do so it is important to have a new 40th Anniversary Logo in place and ready for January 1st 2014.

Yes it will be a lot of work to have that ready for us to launch in January, but both teams believe it is important to be ready to go on day one. In order to do this we are sponsoring the 40th Anniversary Logo Contest.

Membership Processing: While we do not see huge issues with this department, we do however see areas that could improve. Therefore as much a<mark>s possible we will automate the process, which will provide faster</mark> processing time.

Member Liaison: We are implementing a Member Liaison that will contact you, Joe Member, and ask you what you like...what you don't like...and what you would like to see changed. Your identity is strictly confidential... but your answers will be provided to HQ to ensure your voice is being heard.

Communiqué: We have been in contact with previous Chiefs of Communications, previous CQ Editors, publishing editors outside of STARFLEET, and the current Communications Department leadership. We have designed a process to ensure there are redundancies within the Communications department which will prevent burnout of staff and ensure we are prepared for an emergency long before it happens. The CQ is the one tangible item a member receives for their membership, and we want to ensure that it is published and delivered in a fashion that exceeds what our members expect. Anniversaries: The next administration will lead us through two very important anniversaries: STARFLEET's 40th anniversary and Star Trek's 50th anniversary. We have already started working on plans for both of these events...and these plans involve YOU! USPS Pickup and Delivery Delays and Issues By FADM Dave Blaser



Good morning,

In order to ensure that we're all on the same page, this morning I made the ECAB aware of some problems that we are experiencing with the United States Postal Service. Please be aware that this is something which we have only very recently become aware of.

As I'm sure you all know and understand, STARFLEET sends membership packets and launch/commissioning paperwork through the USPS, and we are effectively at the mercy of their services. We have recently discovered that there have been problems being experienced which are stemming from issues within the USPS.

The USPS is very, very behind in collecting mail from satellite locations as a result of staff layoffs that they have been required to perform in order to meet their annual budget.

As a result of a number of delayed or missing commissioning documents, Joe Sare, STARFLEET's Chief of Operations, had contacted and had a discussion with a local

USPS satellite location that he normally deals with, and they had stated that there's so much mail being held right now, and only a little going out each week, that we should expect delays through the end of the year.

The delays and problems with the USPS do not seem to be limited to just the satellite locations, however. When we were looking into the issue with the missing commissioning paperwork, Bran had noted to me that we have heard from several members whose membership packets took over a month (nearly 6 weeks, if I remember the private discussion correctly) to get from the Denver Membership Processing Office to California. This is mail that under normal conditions should take only a week or two to travel the same distance.

So, with that said, please be aware that I have instructed STARFLEET Operations that, from this point forward, any paperwork that is normally sent via regular postal mail is also to be sent as a PDF to chapters that are launching or commissioning.

If you have recently joined or renewed with STARFLEET, and you haven't received your membership packet, we ask that you keep in mind that membership processing should normally take 6-8 weeks for processing and delivery, but as a result of these delays with the USPS, please allow for additional time for delivery of your packet.

If you have not received your packet after no less than 8 weeks after

you have renewed, please be in touch with the Member Services Help Desk by submitting a ticket request at:

http://helpdesk.sfi.org

While the normal reaction to delayed paperwork or some manner of issue might be to automatically point the finger at STARFLEET and say that someone isn't doing their job correctly, I would ask that everyone keep in mind that, as everyone should well know, STARFLEET depends on external vendors as well as public services, both of which are outside of our area of control, and there will occasionally be issues that arise that may be as a result of those external vendors, as well as the possibility that one or more of our volunteer workforce is delayed due to personal matters or issues.

Everyone in STARFLEET works as hard as they can, and puts forward the best effort that we all possibly can, but sometimes things will arise that are out of our control, and I would appreciate that all of our members consider these things, and afford us all a little bit of latitude for the matters which we cannot control.

Chapter of the Year *

For the most outstanding SFI Region One chapter

This is the chapter that exemplifies the best of what STARFLEET is: a club that promotes the ideals of "Star Trek", is involved in community and/ or charitable service, promotes fun activities and projects, and has a solid administration. The ship's newsletter and handbook (if any) should be a reflection of the chapter as well. Submission not to exceed 750 words.



Chapter of Excellence

This is runner up to Chapter of the Year



Best Shakedown Cruise (Chapter in Training) *

Best first year performance by a de-

veloping SFI Region One Chapter

For the chapter in training that best shows the qualities of and the potential of being an ideal SFI chapter. Additionally, the chapter in training CO must have filed all his/her reports on time and receive a good assessment from the sponsor ship and/or the R1 ShoC director. Chapter in training must have 6+ months in service. Submission not to exceed 750 words.



First Mission Citation Best First performance by a chapter

A chapter that has performed it's first year (after being commissioned a chapter) excellently, showing the qualities of being a chapter of the year. Submission not to exceed 750 words.



Support Ship of the Year *

Best support to a chapter in training by a R1 SFI Chapter

Awarded to the Region One chapter that encourages and fosters the growth of a new chapter in training by taking on the added task of responsibility, advising and assisting the "shuttle" as it travels on it's journey from chapter in training to commissioned chapter. This support ship assists the "shuttle" to effectively and actively run their own chapter level events as well as participation in regional or fleet level events when possible. Submission not to exceed 750 words.



Class of Excellence * Commanding Officer of the Year

For a SFI R1 CO who has shown excellent leadership and administration skills, is well thought of by his/her crew, but most significantly, helps set the direction and vision for the chapter. He/she is OTS/OCC qualified, has been a CO for at least two years and has not missed a report or filed late (without excuse). Also has been instrumental in helping any shuttles attached to his/her command; and fosters crew involvement in Region One and STARFLEET. Submission not to exceed 750 words.



Region One Medal

For the most outstanding member of the year

This is for the member who has shown best overall dedication and involvement to SFI Region One and his/her chapter; and has made significant accomplishments to it. Chapter CO submits candidates (one Flag Officer/ one Enlisted/ one Officer) for this award. (Sitting COs are not eligible for the officer or flag category since there is already a CO award) Submission not to exceed 750 words.



Jonathan Archer Award (Rookie CO)

Outstanding performance by a first year chapter CO

For the rookie CO, who has shown excellent leadership and admin skills, is well thought of by his/her crew, but most significantly, helps set the direction and vision for the chapter during his/her first year of command. He/she is OTS/OCC qualified, has been a CO for at least one year and has not missed a report or filed late (without excuse). Also has fostered crew involvement in R1 and Starfleet. Submission not to exceed 1000 words.

RDC of Excellence RDC of the Year

For the SFI R1 RDC who has shown excellent leadership, communications, and administration skills. This RDC aids regional participants in getting the most out of the RDC Program. The RDC reports consistently without fail to the RDC program administrator. RDC Program Director selects the RDC of the Year



Region One Staff member of the year Most outstanding regional staff member

For the most active and efficient staff member in Region One. This award recognizes the Regional Staff members who through their positive efforts enhances the region through exemplary work and example or enhances a regional program for the betterment of the region. This award is open to any appointed member of the Region One staff as defined by the Region One Handbook, excluding members who already have award categories. Region One Coordinator selects staff member of the year.



Newsletter of the Year *

Most outstanding chapter/shuttle newsletter

Ship's newsletter that reflects the personality of the chapter/shuttle; shows diverse submissions from its membership; and with items of science fact as well as science fiction, is informative as well as entertaining.



Communications Excellence

Most outstanding publication by a chapter or

region

This is for publications other then newsletters, like fanzines, hand-books, departmental newsletters, and web pages.

R1 Awards Program

The motto of this program is "Ab Mari, Ad Astra: Excellentin! or, "From the Sea to the Stars: EXCELLENCE!" The awards reflect the typical work and accomplishments that STAR-FLEET has become known for. Rather then have a few simple "all inclusive" awards; like the military, STAR-FLEET Region One has awards that cover specific types of actions and accomplishments. The awards are not "time limited". There are no quarterly, bi-monthly, etc awards. This makes it easier for you when considering award recommendations.

All chapter level recommendations must be approved by either the Commanding Officer or Executive/First Officer.


Before recommending an award, the RO must first be certain the award is warranted in the first place. Awards should not be recommended for a member or unit that simply performs their duty as expected. Typically, a member/unit has made significant accomplishments or achievement; or has performed their duty with above average zeal and diligence. These actions can span year if necessary. This is what should be considered and described in detail on the recommendation form. A link for this form is on the R1 Awards site.sites.google.com/site/sfir1awards

In most cases there are no limits as to how often a member or unit may be recommended, unless otherwise specified. However, if your ship conducts a "Meritorious Mast" (The COs award review board) then you may be considering award recommendations quarterly at the most or annually at the least. Usually, awards are presented annually (as part of ship's anniversary celebration), but recommendations may be made as often only as the action being cited warrants. Remember if the recommendation doesn't meet the criteria of the award desired, then the recommendation will be denied (or the appropriate lesser award approved).

Region One Award Certificates and SFI Region One Award ribbons are available for the award recipient. If the award is approved then please mail a large SASE to receive your certificate (s). The award certificate is sent to the RO for presentation to the recipient (or it may be sent directly to the recipient). Awards can be sent pdf.

We do not accept multiple recommendations for different awards for the same action. The Awards Director will choose the awards the actions fit best. For example you can't receive the Medal of Honor and a DSA for saving a life. Nor can you receive the Chapter of the Year and use the same recommendation for a Unit DSA.

Again, this program is driven by the work or accomplishments of those members and units who **do more** than what's expected or is routine: work that is so significant that it demands recognition. Though we have no doubt that this image describes all Region One chapters and personnel. After all, we are the best Region in all of STARFLEET!

The essay contests has ended. The Publications Department received 7 essays in total and 4 of those came from 1 chapter.







Normally, we try to announce each winning International Conference bid at the IC two years prior, so we would normally have announced IC 2015 at IC 2013 in Dallas. However, a few factors conspired to delay the process, including the hotel selected by one bid team deciding late in the process to stop being a hotel, if you can believe it!

My sincere thanks to all of the teams who bid on IC 2015, including a couple of late entrants that responded to our pleas for additional bids. We ended up with some very attractive proposals, and I'm grateful for all the effort people put into this process.

But, we only have one International Conference per year, and so we must select one host and venue. It's my pleasure to announce that the site of the 2015 International Conference will be Niagara Falls, New York. Niagara Falls is a tremendously popular tourist destination that spans two nations, with adjacent communities in Ontario, Canada and Western New York.

IC'15 will be held at the Conference & Event Center Niagara Falls, with guest rooms at the adjacent Sheraton at the Falls Hotel. The IC is being hosted by a team that includes USS Hadfield, USS Niagara, USS Serling, and USS Accord, making it truly an International Conference. Of course, since we'll be right next to an international border, I'd encourage all U.S. mem-

bers who don't already have a passport to make sure they get one between now and then. The event will be entirely within the U.S., but it's a great opportunity to pop across the border into Canada, even if it's only to walk on the bridge near the Falls.

The IC 2015 team is working on a web site, which should be available shortly, and they'll be making their own announcements before long. Usually, the IC teams have several weeks between being notified they've been selected and the public announcement, but in this case it's just been hours, so we should be patient and let them set things up in the coming days.



The purpose of the R1 Regional Department Chief (RDC) Program is to open communications between chapters Region One. The RDC program started out with

programs just for Department Chiefs, but has evolved to include everyone in the First Fleet. While there are programs for the Department Chiefs, other like-minded regional members can also join. The RDC program has programs for role-playing aliens, costuming and the paranormal. The RDC program continues to expand and grow as the needs of the region arises.

Encryption and mobile Platform

Encryption is so important especially today after the recent NSA revelations. I'd like to offer some insight into encryption on the mobile side. Lets clear this up right now. Here is what the NSA has done concerning encryption in general. Also, going to cover iPhone 5S.

Taken from Matthew Green

- Tampering with national standards (NIST is specifically mentioned) to promote weak, or otherwise vulnerable cryptography.
- 2. Influencing standards committees to weaken protocols.
- 3. Working with hardware and software vendors to weaken encryption and random number generators.
- 4. Attacking the encryption used by 'the next generation of 4G phones'.
- 5. Obtaining cleartext access to a major internet peertopeer voice and text communications system' (Skype?)
- 6. Identifying and cracking vulnerable keys.
- 7. Establishing a Human Intelligence division to infiltrate the global telecommunications industry.
- 8. And worst of all (to me): somehow decrypting SSL connections.

I've been proposing that encryption should be the standard in day to day

operations. Our cell phones are becoming more and more important to us as we use them for almost everything now. There are a lot of juicy nuggets of information a hacker or the NSA would love to have.

Here are a few: Browsing history, cookies, logins, emails, contacts, searches and personal photos. All major cell phone manufactures offer the option to encrypt your phone including the SD card. Locking your phone is required to encrypt it. Encryption on a mobile platform is a strenuous process and should be done with newer phones. I'd recommend a quad core processor and 2GB of ram.

Now, you ask, what about my files and photos on my phone? Yes, I recommend using a service that will upload/sync your files to the cloud. If your phone is lost/stolen you can still get the data.

Uploading to the cloud is another subject and won't get into that here. The new IPhone 5S has arrived and everyone is wanting the fingerprint reader. Let me point out a few things here. Apple's architecture is closed and can't be vetted. Open source/ Open standards are the way to go. Open source code it can be inspected and verified. Also, it can be shared and anyone can use it. Next, biometrics can be defeated, which is the fingerprint reader.

The guys from MythBusters have proven it. Passwords can be changed but fingerprints can't.

Don't rush to purchase this phone til it's been put through it's paces. Can Apple be trusted with fingerprint data?

If you are an older kid or young teen, and going out with friends, make sure that your parents know where you are going and who you are going with. This may seem like a pain but they are your parents and they love you. They just want you to be safe.

If you can drive and are taking a bunch of friends to a party, make sure that you have enough gas to get there. You don't want to run out on a dark street, all alone, like a bad horror movie!

If you parents give you a curfew, be home when they say. It builds trust between you and them and they are doing it for your own safety. If you are going to be late, call them and let them know.

Vandalism is never cool! Throwing eggs at cars and houses is not cool. Someone has to clean it up and it could be you, if you get caught. You can also be arrested and punished as a juvenile. So, don't think that it's fun only if you can get away with it. It's never the right thing to do! Think about how you would feel if someone did that to your house and how bad it would make you feel.

Hurting animals is never acceptable behavior! Some people use Halloween as an excuse to hurt cats and that is just wrong! Not only is it illegal in most places to hurt or torture animals and punishable by law, you should never hurt a helpless living thing.

Have fun on Halloween but keep it safe, have some good, clean fun and your parents will trust you for many Halloweens to come! Showing them how responsible you can be will give you a feeling of pride and make them see just how adult you really are.

Halloween Safety Tips for Drivers

Halloween is a wonderful holiday, but because of increased foot traffic and that Trick-or-Treaters are out at night, the potential for automobile related accidents with young pedestrians increases four times on this night according to a CDC (Center for Disease Control) study.

Streets are literally crawling with all sorts of witches, ghosts, goblins, vampires and all other sorts of costumed people. This makes for added responsibility for drivers to make sure that they drive safer than normal. In many areas, people drive their kids into subdivisions and let them out to walk from house to house. Usually the parent follows behind in the car. This can cause traffic jams in small areas and much confusion as kids dart between cars on the streets going from house to house. A driver is already distracted because they are trying to keep an eye on their own kids and usually aren't paying attention to much else.

Children and adults tend to be preoccupied and may not pay as much attention to safety as they should. They may not see your vehicle or just assume that you see them automatically. Stay on the defensive and you shouldn't have a problem while driving on Halloween night.

Don't use a cell phone or other electronic device while driving on Halloween night. You shouldn't be doing this anyway, the rate of cell phone related auto accidents has jumped dramatically since the use of cell phones and texting has risen so high. Some states have already made laws concerning this and others are working on it.

Pay extra attention, particularly to crosswalks, intersections and the side of the road. Kids tend to walk along the curbs, cutting across the street to get to other homes. Keep scanning all around you as you drive, whether as thru traffic or along with your kids as they trick-or-treat.

Drive below the posted speed limit in residential areas during trick-or-treating hours. This will allow you time to break if you see a child dart in front of you.

Do not pass other vehicles that have stopped in the roadway, they could be dropping off children. This is more common in rural areas but can happen anywhere.

Instruct your child to never get into the car of a stranger. It might be easy for your child to mistake someone else's car your car with the excitement of Halloween. Put a lighted plastic Jack-O-Lantern on your dashboard to make your car more recognizable to your child,

It's also a night that child predators are looking for victims. Let your child know that they should never get into the car of a stranger at any time. If someone stops them and asks for help or offers them candy, tell them to scream as loud as they can and run.

Make sure your child carries a flashlight, glow stick or has reflective tape on their costume to make them more visible to cars. Left them know if they carry a flash light to never shine it in the eyes of a driver. This can cause blindness on the drivers part temporarily and they may not see your child.

If you are dropping off or picking up your kids in an area, pull off the road into a safe spot and turn on your hazard lights to alert other motorists. If you go with your kids from door to door, leave the hazard lights on so other drivers can see your car parked there

Halloween Costume Safety

This section is for both kids and adults. The right costume for you or your child can make all the difference for a fun and safe Halloween. Adults seem to go more for horror themed costumes, while kids seem to go for super heroes, fantasy or the popular TV cartoon of the day.

Letting your child pick out his or her own costume, within reason, will give them a sense of responsibility and make them feel more independent that they were able to select their own costume.

Whether store bought or home made, Halloween costumes should be fun or scary, yet safe. Below are some ideas to hazard-proof your Halloween fun. Costumes should be scary to those who see them, not those who wear them! Here are some easy tips to make your Halloween a safe and happy one!

You should only purchase costumes that are made of flame retardant material. If they are home made, make sure you use fabrics that are inherently flame resistant, such as nylon and polyester. The federal Flammable Fabrics Act (FFA) requires costumes sold at retail to be flameresistant. To prevent costume-related burns, the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) enforces this requirement and recalls costumes and other products that violate the FFA act. If you are going to make a homemade costume.

Buy your costumes from a reputable online or brick-and-mortar store that sells high quality products and has efficient customer service such as the Costume Kingdom.

Try to work reflector strips into your child's costume, a flash light or light stick to make them more visible at night. This will make them more visible by drivers and you can keep an eye on them as well if they get ahead of you while out trick or treating.

Make sure that your costume fits properly to avoid any accidents like tripping over a long dress or cape. Make sure that it is comfortable since it will probably be worn for several hours. Do not include high heel shoes or long dangling pieces of costume that could be tripped over. A scraped knee or bloody nose can really ruin the fun.

If they are carrying a prop such as a scythe or sword, make sure they are made out of a flexible plastic that will bend if fallen on. Most of the props available today are made of flexible plastic.

⚠ Be sure to pre-test any makeup you plan to use by applying a small amount on the arm of the person who will be wearing it for about thirty minutes a couple of days in advance. If a rash, redness, swelling, or any other signs of irritation develop where the makeup was applied, it could be a sign of a possible allergy or adverse reaction.

If a mask is worn, make sure that the eye holes are big enough to see not only in front but peripherally as well. You may have to cut them open further yourself. If so, use some black or gray grease paint around the eye socket to cover skin.

If going out with a group, choose or make the costume a unique one, so it can be spotted easily in a crowded area. Use flashing lights or jewelry to stand out.

If you have more than one child, save costumes from year to year to pass down to younger children or exchange them with friends. You can add extra accessories or dress them up a little to make them different from year to year.

If you plan on doing any trick-ortreating with a group, and yes, some adults still do go out trick-or-treating, make sure that your group isn't too big and that you all have some type of reflective or flashing item on your person so cars can see if.

If you are wearing a mask, make sure that it is comfortable, has adequate eye holes and proper ventilation. If you have to cut the eye holes bigger, just use matching grease paint around your eyes to fill in where you have removed mask.

Momen, if you are wearing something "low cut and sexy", as Elvira would say, make sure that you can easily get in and out of the costume for bathroom purposes. Nothing will ruin your fun at a night club or party faster than not being able to make it to the bathroom in time.

Picking your costume should be a fun and exciting time for you and your child. Just take your time, try it on in the store if possible and make sure that it's something that you really like!

The Engineering RDC program is moving along slowly however we do have a few more people active then in the past.


Two new resources have also been added to the Engineering resource database. One is a Facebook group concerned primarily with Star Trek Modeling the other is a page of Star-

We have a web resource where you can find information about our program, science articles, and even a CSO Handbook. I recently moved (to the county next door) and had some changes with my internet service provider (still is Charter), and had to change the url for R/1 Sciences, which now is:

And I always want to take the opportunity to mention the Holodeck Science Program. Well, the overarching Holodeck umbrella program is no more, but its former departments are continuing. Sciences is a STAR-FLEET interest group going by its alter ego of (lowercase) Starfleet Sciences. I'm director (CO) of Starfleet Sciences and we have a web site at (note the new url)

For half a century, the world has applauded John Glenn as a heart-stirring American hero. He lifted the nation's spirits when, as one of the original Mercury 7 astronauts, he was blasted alone into orbit around the Earth; the enduring affection for him is so powerful that even now people find themselves misting up at the sight of his face or the sound of his voice.

But for all these years, Glenn has had a hero of his own, someone who he has seen display endless courage of a different kind:

Annie Glenn.

They have been married for 68 years.

He is 90; she turned 92 on Friday.

This weekend there has been news coverage of the 50th anniversary of Glenn's flight into orbit. We are being reminded that, half a century down the line, he remains America's unforgettable hero.

He has never really bought that.

Because the heroism he most cherishes is of a sort that is seldom cheered. It belongs to the person he has known longer than he has known anyone else in the world.

John Glenn and Annie Castor first knew each other when -- literally -they shared a playpen.

In New Concord, Ohio, his parents and hers were friends. When the families got together, their children played.

John -- the future Marine fighter pilot, the future test-pilot ace, the future astronaut -- was pure gold from the start. He would end up having what it took to rise to the absolute pinnacle of American regard during the space race; imagine what it meant to be the young John Glenn in the small confines of New Concord.

Three-sport varsity athlete, most admired boy in town, Mr. Everything.

Annie Castor was bright, was caring, was talented, was generous of spirit. But she could talk only with the most excruciating of difficulty. It haunted her.

Her stuttering was so severe that it was categorized as an "85%" disability -- 85% of the time, she could not manage to make words come out.

When she tried to recite a poem in elementary school, she was laughed at. She was not able to speak on the telephone. She could not have a regular conversation with a friend.

And John Glenn loved her.

Even as a boy he was wise enough to understand that people who could not see past her stutter were missing out on knowing a rare and wonderful girl.

They married on April 6, 1943. As a military wife, she found that life as she and John moved around the country could be quite hurtful. She has written: "I can remember some very painful experiences -- especially the ridicule." In department stores, she would wander unfamiliar aisles trying to find the right section, embarrassed to attempt to ask the salesclerks for help. In taxis, she would have to write requests to the driver, because she couldn't speak the destination out loud. In restaurants, she would point to the items on the menu.

A fine musician, Annie, in every community where she and John moved, would play the organ in church as a way to make new friends. She and John had two children; she has written: "Can you imagine living in the modern world and being afraid to use the telephone? 'Hello' used to be so hard for me to say. I worried that my children would be injured and need a doctor. Could I somehow find the words to get the information across on the phone?"

John, as a Marine aviator, flew 59 combat missions in World War II and 90 during the Korean War. Every time he was deployed, he and Annie said goodbye the same way. His last words to her before leaving were:

"I'm just going down to the corner store to get a pack of gum."

And, with just the two of them there, she was able to always reply:

"Don't be long."

On that February day in 1962 when the world held its breath and the Atlas rocket was about to propel him toward space, those were their words, once again. And in 1998, when, at 77, he went back to space aboard the shuttle Discovery, it was an understandably tense time for them. What if something happened to end their life together?

She knew what he would say to her before boarding the shuttle. He did -- and this time he gave her a present to hold onto:

A pack of gum.

She carried it in a pocket next to her heart until he was safely home.

Many times in her life she attempted various treatments to cure her stutter. None worked.

But in 1973, she found a doctor at Hollin's College in Roanoke, Virginia who ran an intensive program she and John hoped would help her. She traveled there to enroll and to give it her best effort. The miracle she and John had always waited for at last, as miracles will do, arrived. At age 53, she was able to talk fluidly, and not in brief, anxiety-ridden, agonizing bursts.

John has said that on the first day he heard her speak to him with confidence and clarity, he dropped to his knees to offer a prayer of gratitude.

He has written: "I saw Annie's perseverance and strength through the years and it just made me admire her and love her even more." He has heard roaring ovations in countries around the globe for his own valor, but his awe is reserved for Annie, and what she accomplished: "I don't know if I would have had the courage."

Her voice is so clear and steady now that she regularly gives public talks. If you are lucky enough to know the Glenns, the sight and sound of them bantering and joking with each other and playfully finishing each others' sentences is something that warms you and makes you thankful just to be in the same room.

Monday will be the anniversary of the Mercury space shot, and once again people will remember, and will speak of the heroism of Glenn the astronaut.

This is the design we (The Star League) used last year. Really simple to build, low cost under a hundred dollars (not counting trailer). This is a really rough sketch showing one possibility.

Materials:

-Irrigation tubing. One Roll 1/2 dia -2 each 1/2 irrigation tubing couplings -7 ea 3/4 pvc tees (shown in blue at the bottom) and red at the ring joints. -32 feet heavy wall PVC pipe shown in green. (Can be adjusted for size of your planet.

- -Two 3/4 pvc elbow shown in blue at -the top of the two legs.
- -4 each 3/4 pvc crosses
- -1 can spray adhesive
- -1 roll of black mesh (bird netting)
- -Tinsel two colors amount will vary based on size
- -Layered snow sheeting . Amount varies with size of float.
- -One sheet of plywood or wafer board recommend it be 3/4 thick wood screws various size and

lenath

 -1 can black spray paint trailer to mount to for pulling in the parade

Tools:

PVC cutter, drill bit slightly smaller than your wood screws. Note at the point you are using screws to join the pvc pipe you will need to drill a pilot hole.

It is recommended that you assemble the frame with gluing or screwing in place to check measurements and test for squarenes before adding tinsel.

First lay out your circle for the outer wall of the planet with the irrigation tubing, everything else is built and sized based on this circle.

Add your 3 pvc tees and crosses based on the diagram, couple the irrigation tubing and place a screw in the joint to hold together, this can also be a glued joint.

Next measure and cut 4 pieces of 3/4 pvc pipe to make your cross in the center of the circle. Screw or glue these together.

You now have the outer structure of your planet.



- . The ability to perform duties in a timely and responsible manner. While it is true that this is a volunteer position, you will have certain duties




- . Willingness to invest personal time, effort, money for postage, and etc. to perform an important, but sometimes thankless, job for the benefit of Region One's members.

The USS Ronald E. McNair also known as Starfleet of Columbia is an established chapter and member of Starfleet International, one of the largest Star Trek themed fan clubs in the world. Founded by Ray Seay and Cookie Williams, the ship started out as a new chapter, known as a shuttle-craft, under the sponsorship of the USS Olympus, which was headquartered in Sumter, SC. The chapter began officially in June of 1993. After working hard for several months the

shuttle acquired the required number of members to qualify for full ship status and was launched as a shuttle November 4 1993 as the USS Ronald E. McNair, NCC-61809. The crew (chapter members) chose that the McNair should be a Nebula class starship that functioned in the Star Trek Next Generation timeline in their virtual storyline. It was named to honor astronaut Ronald E. McNair, a native of Lake City, SC and a mission specialist killed in the Challenger launch accident. Ronald was a native of Lake City, SC.

Ray Seay's vision for the ship was that it would perform the mission of charity and public service to the community. This was the heart and spirit of Gene Roddenberry's vision of help and fellowship that he fostered through the creation of the Star Trek television series. The crew of the McNair performed numerous services such as blood drives for the Red Cross, Adopt a Highway clean up missions, serving as participants in the world famous Jerry Lewis Telethon for Muscular Dystrophy and many other services. The crew also did various projects to generate revenue for charities and operating costs by having bake sales, car washes. and selling items at local flea markets. After the first two years of the ship's service, First Officer Cookie Williams stepped down as first officer and was replaced by Henry Dubose.

The crew of the ship not only did charity work but also enjoyed participating in trips known as away missions to various Star Trek and science fiction related conventions and events. As a member of Region One of Starfleet International, the ship's crew participated in the annual Region One conferences and summits as well as serving as security volunteers for many conventions conducted throughout the North and South Carolina area, to include some excursions to events in Georgia and Virginia. In 1995 at a convention conducted

in Columbia, SC, Ethan Phillips, the actor who portrayed Neelix from Star Trek Voyager, was a guest host. He was recruited by Ray Seay and became a charter member of the USS Ronald E. McNair. Over the next year the ship would continue with its core mission of helping others but was also able to sponsor two conventions of its own in the Columbia area. The first happened in November of 1996 and had as its main quest William Shatner. This was significant in that Mr. Shatner had not performed for a convention crowd in many years. Ray Seav stepped down as captain of the McNair in February of 1997 and was replaced by Stephen Stott.

Stephen Stott's tour of duty as captain was short but in that time the McNair was able once again to sponsor a convention in the Columbia, SC area. Actors who played Nog (Aron Eisenberg) from Star Trek Deep Space Nine and Chewbacca (Peter Mayhew) of Star Wars fame were the guest stars. This event, once again, served to increase the prestige and popularity of the USS Ronald E. McNair as a leading science fiction club in the region. Due to military commitments and a move, Stephen Stott had to step down as captain of the McNair and turned over command of the ship to Jerry Ward in 1998. Jerry Ward served as CO of the McNair until June 2000 when he stepped down and Ray Seay filled in as CO until the December election of Jennifer Kelly who served as CO until January 2005 when Pamela Michaud was elected CO.

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Voyager 1 probe has left the solar system http://www.space.com

NASA's Voyager 1 probe has left the solar system, boldly going where no machine has gone before.

Thirty-six years after it rocketed away from Earth, the plutonium powered spacecraft has escaped the sun's influence and is now cruising 11 1/2 billion miles away in interstellar space, or the vast, cold emptiness between the stars, NASA said Thursday.

And just in case it encounters intelligent life out there, it is carrying a gold-plated, 1970s-era phonograph record with multicultural greetings from Earth, photos and songs, including Chuck Berry's "Johnny B. Goode," along with Beethoven, Bach, Mozart and Louis Armstrong.

Never before has a man-made object left the solar system as it is commonly understood.

"We made it," said an ecstatic Ed Stone, the mission's chief scientist, who waited decades for this moment. NASA celebrated by playing the "Star Trek" theme at a news conference in Washington.

Voyager 1 actually made its exit more than a year ago, scientists said. But since there's no "Welcome to Interstellar Space" sign out there, NASA waited for more evidence before concluding that the probe had in fact broken out of the hot plasma bubble surrounding the planets.

Voyager 1, which is about the size of a small car, is drifting in a part of the universe littered with the remnants of ancient star explosions.

It will study exotic particles and other phenomena and will radio the data back to Earth, where the Voyager team awaits the starship's discoveries. It takes about 17 hours for its signal to reach Earth.

While Voyager 1 may have left the solar system as most people understand it, it still has hundreds, perhaps thousands, of years to go before bidding adieu to the last icy bodies that make up our neighborhood.

At the rate it is going, it would take 40,000 years to reach the nearest star, Alpha Centauri.

Voyager 1's odyssey began in 1977 when the spacecraft and its twin, Voyager 2, were launched on a tour of the gas giant planets of the solar system.

After beaming back dazzling postcard views of Jupiter's giant red spot and Saturn's shimmering rings, Voyager 2 hopscotched to Uranus and Neptune. Meanwhile, Voyager 1 used Saturn as a gravitational slingshot to power itself past Pluto.

Last year, scientists monitoring Voyager 1 noticed strange happenings that suggested the spacecraft had broken through: Charged particles streaming from the sun suddenly vanished. Also, there was a spike in galactic cosmic rays bursting in from the outside.

Since there was no detectable change in the direction of the magnetic field lines, the team assumed the far-flung craft was still in the heliosphere, or the vast bubble of charged particles around the sun.

The Voyager team patiently waited for a change in magnetic field direc-

tion -- thought to be the telltale sign of a cosmic border crossing.

But in the meantime, a chance solar eruption that shook Voyager I last spring provided the scientists with the data they needed, convincing them the boundary had been crossed in August of last year.

With the new data, "it took us 10 seconds to realize we were in interstellar space," said Don Gurnett, a Voyager scientist at the University of lowa who led the new research, published online in the journal Science.

Not everyone is on board.

The new observations are fascinating, but "it's premature to judge," said Lennard Fisk, a space science professor at the University of Michigan and former NASA associate administrator who was not part of the team. "Can we wait a little while longer? Maybe this picture will clear up the farther we go."

Fisk was bothered by the absence of a change in magnetic field direction.

Voyager 2 trails behind at 9 1/2 billion miles from the sun. It may take another three years before Voyager 2 joins its twin on the other side. Eventually, the Voyagers will run out of nuclear fuel and will have to power down their instruments, perhaps by 2025.

Until then, Voyager 1 is "the little spacecraft that could," said mission project manager Suzanne Dodd of the NASA Jet Propulsion Laboratory. "We keep on going."

Next cut two short nipples (3/4 pvc pipe) to make the joint between your two horizontal outside cross's and you ninety degree 3/4 pvc elbows. add two legs equal length to the elbows to make your planet the desired height measure and cut the center leg to match your the height between the bottom cross and the other legs screw or glue these in place. add 3 remaining tees to the bottom of the legs note run these perpendicular to the length of the planet add 3ft extension to these tees, stand up and screw the assembled planet to the plywood) Now lock into place with screws the two loose on the outer rim ninety degrees apart these will serve as starting points for your orbital ring.

Paint PVC assembly black, once dry add mesh reinforcement to pvc circle / planet covering the entire pink shaded area.

Now tie tinsel to outer planet rim, in two foot sections spray adhesive on pvc rim and mesh, and wrap with tinsel. allow the tinsel frill segments to overlap, continue until entire planet is covered.

Cut two nipples equal length to match the distance you wish your orbital ring to extend from the edges of your planet.

Once in place add tees to each end perpendicular to the planet, run you irrigation tubing through the tops of the tees until you have a complete ring. Cut the tubing add irrigation tubing coupling and screw or glue in place. add screws to the tees and irrigation tubing to hold in place. Paint remaining exposed pvc black using care not to get an on tinsel. Using a different color tinsel warp the tubing making the orbital ring add ship if desired.

This worked out well for us, these instructions are from memory so please use at your discretion.

Accessorize as desired.



What do you think are the duties and responsibilities of a chapter CO?

One meaning of commanding officer is the highest-ranking officer and commander of a unit. On starships, the commanding officer usually has the rank of captain. On Starbases, the commanding officer is sometimes referred to as "portmaster". Regardless of what, when or where the commanding officer wears many hats under different titles always executing their duties and assuming their responsibilities to the fullest extent. As the CO of a chapter it is one's duty not only to explore strange new ways to promote the chapter or seek out new humanoids to recruit while boldly advertising their ship where no man's gone before.

You must be firstly, completely connected with your shipmates. Being Captain doesn't mean you get to sit in your ready room for 29 days and only come out once to a monthly meeting, if you even manage to do that. Communication is vital for any ship in order to function. Whether it be via email, social networking or even phone calls if the CO doesn't inform his/her crew of their missions, then the ship becomes neutralized and dry-docked.

Secondly being the Captain means having a broad skill set, you are essentially responsible for everything and everybody. How your crew presents themselves is a reflection upon your administration. By using clear, concise objectives for your crew to follow your leadership will be solidified.

As Captain you are never "not worthy" enough to share duties with your fellow crew members. Leading by example will be noticed and appreciated by your crew. Praising your crew for their good work will get you positive feedback, however do not condone harassment or misconduct to avoid negative feedback. To helpfully evolve the problem is a better route. Always make sure to, with praise, award the appropriate crew members with the recognition they deserve either through awards, certifications or promotions.

The Captain's responsibilities to his/ her chapter is to promote the chapter, advertise the chapter, recruit for the chapter and regulate the chapter, adhering to the by-laws and taking account for the monies in the account. Using the media can generate a lot of attention for the chapter and it is up to the Captain to capitalize on that. Securing spots at local con's or even a general walk-through can lead to a great recruiting event. Promoting the chapter at local events, non-for-profits events and community events will get your chapter attention as a partner in the community and a symbol of goodwill.

If that's not the most optimistic outlook to our future, then there's no Captain that will know what one is. To head up one of Gene's chapters in his universe takes more than duties and responsibilities; it takes the desire to further Gene's teachings of a better future for all of us.

Unfortunately for this office, her unorthodox methods bordering on cultural insult proved quite troublesome at times in the latter case even though she was later exonerated.

Even so, Starfleet Medical applauds Dr. Crusher for her stand against a lack of concern for experiment research on patients while other treatments are still viable, citing her logs concerning Lieutenant Worf's spinal paralysis and Dr. Toby Russell's genotronic research. And her use of ship's phasers, of all things, to deliver a live-born spacefaring alien as large scale Caesarean section procedure is nothing short of ingenious.

In view of reports testifying to Dr. Crusher's actions to care for 21st century natives aboard her vessel during temporal maneuvers with possible Prime Directive implications, this office finds no fault with her performance in light of the greater temporal crisis at hand.

Although suffering her share of life tragedies, Beverly Crusher brings to her work and her relationships a deep-rooted sense of ethics as well as a freshness and good humor that is infectious. Indeed, at times she has served as the glue to hold situations together, while at other times acting as the needler to provoke a necessary reaction or course.

Dr. Crusher spent her formative

years with her grandmother, Felisa Howard, who raised her from an early age after her mother died. In fact, it was Felisa's knowledge of folk medicine which allowed the two Howards to be among the few survivors of the Arvada III colony disaster, inspiring the younger Crusher to choose medicine as her life's work. Unknown to her at the time. Felisa was involved with an anaphasic "lover" who derived lifeaffirming sustenance in return for the companionship — a secret stretching back through generations of the family which nearly consumed Dr. Crusher herself.

The discovery occurred only upon Felisa's death in 2370 on Caldos IV, where they had lived after Arvada III until Crusher left her to attend Starfleet Academy. Before those moves with Felisa, young Beverly had spent her earliest years on Earth's North America, which she still considers "home"; she studied tap and jazz dance there and won several awards in competition in St. Louis. Intimate relationships have been mostly healthy for Crusher, who suffered with typical human growingup angst: getting a crush on a soccer player three years her senior, Stefan, at age 8, and dying her naturally red hair brunette at age 13 when she fretted over teenage popularity.

It was her marriage to Lt. Cmdr. Jack Crusher that provided the major trauma of her adult life when he died on an away team mission off the U.S.S. Stargazer under Captain Jean-Luc Picard in 2355. Before their wedding on July 20, 2348, during her medical schooling, the future Crushers had dated for several months until he finally proposed by sending her the book "How To Advance Your Career Through Marriage." The two had first been introduced by Walker Keel, who with Jack had been Picard's closest friend during their early years in Starfleet; ironically, her relationship

with Jack followed an intense but brief affair that had already run its course.

The new couple and Picard became close friends during those years the men served on Picard's *U.S.S. Stargazer*. The captain later accompanied



her to the Starbase 32 morgue to view Jack's corpse, but it was not until years later again — again, in 2370 — that Picard confirmed her suspicion that he too was attracted to her, thanks to a telepathic linkage while held as spies on Kesprytt. Picard had denied there would be any personal problems when she signed aboard the U.S.S. Enterprise as his CMO in 2364 at Farpoint Station, but in reality both knew they shared a latent interest in each other by the time of the Tsiolkovsky virus epidemic that brought it out only a few weeks later.

Her husband's death also left a void for their son, Wesley, who had been born a year after they married. A lieutenant at the time, Jack Crusher recorded the first and only entry in a series of holo-tape messages to his infant son, but she opted not to share it with Wesley until 2367. As a mother, Dr. Crusher raised a gifted, intense young man alone, never resorting to corporal punishment until suffering the effects of Sarek's Bendaii Syn-

drome. Astounded at the Traveler being's prognosis for his development in 2364, she fretted later that he was working too hard at the expense of a social life. His role in the Nova Squadron scandal at Starfleet Academy in 2368 shocked and saddened her without affecting their basic relation-

ship until his departure with the Traveler two years later.

In her later years Dr. Crusher had another intimate yet short-lived relationship with the Joined Trill ambassador Odan, and had displayed affection for an evolving Zalkon called "John Doe" and visiting historian Berlinghoff Rasmussen — the latter only until his time-traveling story turned out to be a hoax.

Dr. Crusher, who often serves a night watch on the bridge, aided in the capture of the renegade Borg under Lore in 2370 with the strategic loss of their craft while

in command of the *Enterprise*. She has not shirked from risk on away missions, as when exploring the Borg ship upon Picard's abduction in 2366. She was taken as a hostage by the Ansata terrorists to provide their medical care on Rutia IV earlier that same year, and was nearly captured by Cardassians with Worf on a covert raid on Celtris III with Picard, who was

taken. Ironically, she almost died in a diminishing universe created from her own mind, thanks to a subspace warp bubble experiment of her son gone awry.

As can be seen from the theatre masks decorating the walls of her quarters, much of the doctor's wellrounded personality stems from her many interests in the stage arts. Although she hid her dance skills in later years to avoid the hated nickname of "The Dancing Doctor" that stuck in medical school, she has actively fostered her own acting class and theatre troupe here aboard the Enterprise. Among the productions she has directed are "Cyrano de Bergerac," "The Pirates of Penzance," "Frame of Mind," and "Something for Breakfast"; her students have included Lieutenant Barclay, a reluctant Commander La Forge, and even Commander Riker, whose halting first scenes improved dramatically under her coaching before culminating with his riveting performance in "Frame of Mind."

Beyond the arts, another hobby is ethnobotany, and she can more than hold her own in poker. She is fond of fine-weave metallic fabrics. She reports a mild fear of heights, although this counselor has not seen it detract from either her duties or recreation.

Counselor's update, SD 50950 review:

Having survived the second Borg invasion and its temporal repercussions, I am pleased to review logs revealing Dr. Crusher's clear-headed, quick-thinking actions to evacuate her patients and as Picard's temporary XO during the ship evacuation process.

I also admire how she overcame her long-time disinclination toward Emergency Medical Holograms to use it as a tactical tool during the crisis.






