Star Cross – LCDR Joan Savage - USS Indiana - On the afternoon of September 8, 2019 at about 12:30pm, LCDR Joan M. Savage (passenger) Debbie Daubenspeck were making their way home from church. They were traveling on US 1 along the coast of Florida a few days after evacuating from the threat of Hurricane Dorian only days before. Joan was listening to Debbie and noticed that the car was drifting dangerously near the guard rail. Turning to Debbie, Joan observed her to fall forward onto the steering wheel as the car veered left out of the lane -

toward oncoming traffic. Unsuccessfully trying to pull her friend up, Joan had to let her lay over the gearshift in order to reach the wheel. Unable to downshift, take the vehicle out of gear nor reach a brake of any kind, Joan realized that she had to quickly grasp the steering wheel over Debbie's body and regain control or they would crash. Joan did regain control, and pulled the car into one lane. She continued to drive the car from the passenger seat while attempting to revive her friend by patting her face and continually calling her name. After a couple of minutes, Debbie did groggily regain consciousness, but was not yet fully aware of the situation. Dazed, she was able to sit up in the driver's seat while Joan continued to steer the car, calling Debbie's name and instructing her to apply the brakes. Debbie then came fully to and was able to stop the car on the shoulder. Joan then helped her friend change places and immediately drove Debbie to a local hospital emergency room, where Debbie was treated for a bump on the head and admitted for observation overnight. After tests were run, she was released the following day. Joan suffered a bruised left hand from grabbing the steering wheel, but no other injuries.(201909.16)

Remembering Aron Eisenberg, 1969-2019



StarTrek.com is saddened to report the passing of Aron Eisenberg, the beloved actor who portrayed Nog in the Star Trek: Deep Space Nine.

Eisenberg's wife, Malíssa Longo — confirmed on Facebook that he passed away today, on September 21, at the age of 50.

Eisenberg, described himself as "actor, filmmaker and proud father" and was a professional photographer who shot landscapes, concerts, corporate photography, portraits and more. Eisenberg's earliest credits included an episode of the series Straight Up, the TV movie Amityville: The Evil Escapes and the features The Horror Show, Playroom and Beverly Hills Brats, all in the late 1980s.



When he was cast as Nog, the producers told him nothing about the

character, nor was he aware of how many episodes he'd be called upon to do. As he told StarTrek.com in a 2012 interview, "I thought every episode I was doing might be my last episode." Eisenberg ultimately played Nog in more than 40 episodes of DS9. He also portrayed Kar, the young Kazon-Ogla, in the Star Trek: Voyager episode "Initiations."

On December 29, 2015, Eisenberg underwent a kidney transplant — the second of his life. Quite miraculously, Eisenberg spent only four months on the waiting list before finding a match. That match? A friend named Beth Bernstein, who'd seen Eisenberg's Facebook post about needing a new kidney, offered to donate one of hers to him, and was a match for Eisenberg. "She is just so incredibly selfless to give to me like this," Eisenberg told StarTrek.com in 2015, "that words cannot express my gratitude to her."

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'Neutrinos Captain'



Star Trek sensors relied on a number of fictional and real cosmological signals to navigate, investigate, and get into mischief. Of these, neutrinos, give the crew of the Enterprise-D and today's physicists views into the heart of stars, fission reactors, and soon fusion reactors. However, today's tools are devices up to 1km cubed, deep underground or water, which produce the weakest of signals. That's a single sensor about the size of a Borg cube. Impractical is an understatement as a result of the nature of neutrinos.

Neutrinos are nearly massless neutral elementary particles, far smaller than electrons that result from the conversion of energy into matter during nuclear reactions who react with normal matter only very weakly. They are neutral in that they do not carry a charge, like a magnet, so they are not repelled or attracted by electrons and protons. Neutrinos take neutrality one step further in that they are not attracted by or repelled by the forces (Strong and Weak nuclear forces) found inside of atoms very well. This is like Odo walking the promenade past Ferengi and Jem Hadar without being noticed. This property allows them to pass through all matter without slowing down. Only if they come very close to or hit an atom's nucleus are they seen as they transfer kinetic energy to their target as they bounce off. This makes them very difficult to detect for study, much less for practical applications.

That is until Dr. Juan Collar of the University of Chicago was able to develop a device that takes advantage of slower moving neutrino's interaction with mid-size heavy nuclei via a quantum-mechanical wave duality mechanism. Complicated way of saying the device looks for weak photon packets (~10 photons) released when a slower neutrino's wave function interacts with an entire nucleus's wave function causing a small, but detectable release of coherent light. This is akin to shaking an iron bell by waving a magnet past it. It makes barely a sound, but a sound it makes. Current devices instead use fast neutrinos slamming into a neutron or proton to release a bright flash, like ringing a small bell with a BB gun.

The advantage here is that the slower neutrinos see a much larger target and much more frequently which leads to both more neutrinos detected and the ability to use a smaller detector. The scale difference in detectors is immense. Kamiokande and Super Kamiokande are two detectors used to make breakthroughs in understanding neutrinos using 1,000 metric tons of pure water and 50,000 metric tons respectively as targets for neutrinos. Dr. Collar's detector, in contrast, uses less than a kilogram of a transparent crystal in a device the size of a fire extinguisher.

While still early in the development of Dr. Collar's device and the use of coherent elastic neutrino nucleus scattering to study neutrinos, the single leap forward it represents is an exponential leap in our ability to study and perhaps use neutrinos in the near future.


