




We still have one member that has a bouncing email and I've contacted the spouse and so has Linda on FB ... so I've done all I can do.





Many of you are probably already aware of most of these updates, but I wish to take some space in this month's newsletter to report out to the entire membership, to ensure everyone is informed.

LCARS is used throughout the site with a strong focus on in-universe elements, such as the bridge background soundtrack, that provides an immersive experience. The web site has

six main sections, all navigable by the LCARS menu at the top of every page. The **Home Page** displays any immediate announcements, with background on the chapter and pictures of the chapter leadership.

To help navigate the home page, the LCARS has an "**About**" button that jumps to each section. In addition, this button can take the viewer to our "Hall of Heroes," which memorializes the names of chapter members who have died. Also, there is a link to the Engineering Department's web site. If any other department creates a web site or some other dedicated presence on the internet, let me know and I will include a link from the Chapter web site.

The **Enlist Page** is entirely devoted to recruiting. The page not only makes a "sales pitch" on why a person should join SFI, it provides step-by-step instructions (including pictures) on how to join. The **Newsletter Page** always displays the current newsletter in a PDF reader, thus making it easy for the membership and the public to read it online. In addition, it provides communicator "buttons" that link to previous editions of the newsletter, in case someone missed an issue.



Hello everyone! I am in the home stretch with making tombstones ... before you know it Halloween will be here!





In the next few columns, I will be showcasing what I have been working on but for this month's column I wanted to show some unique items that I have made. I was commissioned to make 2 vintage Testor brand model paint bottles. The back story to this is quite interesting!

In the early 1960's Monogram Model Company created a Custom 1923 Model "T" Hot Rod. It is Red, lots of chrome and sold quite well back when it was new. It inspired many young people to start building Hot Rods when they became adults.

Fast forward to 2020 - a gentleman had built a life-size functioning replica of this car but he took it a step further. He wanted it to look like that the actual model had come to life! He commissioned me to build 2 oversized Testor paint bottles that would be on display with the car at shows and events.

I started out first by getting an old Testors bottle off of eBay. I was able to use that as reference and scale it up to the correct size. The shape is not that complicated but getting the cap made was the challenge! It has numerous ridges in it so that you can

grip it to unscrew the cap off of the bottle. One of the bottles needed to have the lid in place but the other the lid is removed and a giant paint brush is inside the jar. I used a sign company to create the labels for the bottle along with the writing on the brush. Making a small everyday item into an oversized piece has its challenges, and discrepancies in the shape and style would be easily seen so I had to get this as close as possible to the real ones.

On these pieces I was lucky in that I did not need to finish them; the client had a body shop in mind with the correct paint colors so they were able to coat and sand them to a high gloss shine! These pieces turned out beautifully! The car and the display are now on display at the National Rod and Custom Car Hall of Fame in Afton, Oklahoma. Fun, quirky pieces that people can enjoy for years to come!

The list is too long to list here but I would advise everyone to do a google search and be aware of those that are currently most prevalent. It is amazing the amount of trouble that scammers will go to in trying to separate good people from their hard-earned money.



I recall one scam that was presented to my mother-in-law a few years back. Supposedly my daughter was on the phone

When I was working for the power company, we were called to go repair an underground high voltage line at a US Army base in Blackstone VA. At that time, it was called Camp Pickett, now Fort Barfoot. One yelled at us "to turn that friggin flashing beacon off." (we could do that).

That's when 'Sgt. Carter' told us we had screwed up their "night operations" and they were advancing on another group, which he stopped a mile away. Carter's men had noticed us a half mile away and stopped advancing until they realized we weren't going anywhere. After they left, two of us said they had electronic guns and two said it was paintball... looked REAL to me! Didn't matter, WE had a job to do.

The reason I wrote this is because I never realized how much our lights, the beacon light and our PRESENCE screwed up the planned night operations for those men ... we were a random element thrown in ... just doing our job. Recently I was taking an Academy course on "Military Night Operations" and I learned they *train* for months to see in the dark in full gear

Dark Adaptation is the process by which the eyes increase their sensitivity to low levels of light. Soldiers adapt to the darkness at varying degrees and rates. During the first 30 minutes in a dark environment, the eye sensitivity increases roughly 10,000 times. Dark adaptation is affected by exposure to bright lights such as matches, flashlights, flares, and vehicle headlights. Full recovery from this exposure may take up to 45 minutes. Night vision goggles impede dark adaptation. However, if a soldier adapts to the dark before donning the goggles, he gains full dark adaptation in about two minutes after removing them.

There was much more in the course but this was an experience that I remember well and although we were on an

# MEDICAL MINUTE; August 2024 Alpha-gal

Like a lot of people my sister, Shelly, has recently been diagnosed with Alpha-gal. Because more and more people are being diagnosed with it, I decided to do this month's medical minute on Alpha gal. Most of the information I have is from the Mayo Clinic.

Most of us know that people acquire Alpha gal from a tick bite. People become allergic to red meat and other products made from mammals. In the United States, the condition usually begins with the bite of the Lone Star tick. The bite transfers a sugar molecule called alphagal into the body.

The time delay between eating meat products and getting an allergic reaction may be one reason alpha-gal syndrome was not understood at first. For example, a possible connection between a T-bone steak with dinner and hives at midnight is far from clear.

Avoid tick bites to prevent alpha-gal syndrome. Wear long pants tucked inside your socks, hat and gloves, and long-sleeved shirts when you're in wooded, grassy areas. Apply insect repellent with a 20% or higher concentration of the ingredient DEET to your skin.

Alpha gal causes mild to severe allergic reactions to red meat, such as beef, pork or lamb. It also can cause reactions to other foods that come from mammals, such as dairy products or gelatins.











Get help if you have food allergy symptoms after you eat, even several hours after you eat. See your primary care health care provider or an allergy specialist.

Get emergency medical treatment if you have symptoms of a serious allergic reaction that causes trouble breathing, called anaphylaxis, such as: trouble breathing, rapid, weak pulse, dizzy or lightheaded feeling, drooling and not being able to swallow, full-body redness and warmth, called flushing.

If you or your doctor suspects you have alpha-gal they will probably want to perform a blood test. A blood test can confirm and measure the amount of alpha-gal antibodies in your bloodstream. This is the key test for diagnosis.

A skin test can also be performed. A health care provider pricks your skin and exposes it to small amounts of substances taken from commercial or fresh red meat. If you're allergic, you get a raised bump called a hive at the test site on your skin. Your provider or allergist also may test your skin for an allergic reaction to certain types of red meat. That's because there are different kinds of allergies to meat. Alpha-gal syndrome treatment involves avoiding the foods that cause your reaction. Always check the ingredient labels on store-bought foods. Make sure they don't have red meat or meat-based ingredients, such as: beef, pork, lamb, organ meats, and gelatins.

Check soup stock cubes, gravy packages and flavor ingredients in prepackaged products. Ask your health care provider or allergist for a list of foods to avoid, including meat extracts used in flavoring. The names of some meat-based ingredients make them easy to miss. Some medications will cause a reaction also. Over the counter gel tablets contain allergens. Read labels carefully and/or ask you pharmacist to be sure you stay safe.

Be extra careful when you eat at restaurants and social get-togethers. Many people don't understand how serious an allergic food reaction can be. And few people know that meat allergies exist. Even a small amount of red meat can cause a serious reaction.

If you're worried that a food may contain something you're allergic to, don't try it. Do what you can to lower your risk. For example, you could bring your own food to a party if guests are making food on a shared cooking surface.

For a serious allergic reaction, you may need a shot of epinephrine and emergency care. Many people with allergies carry a device called an epinephrine auto-injector. It's a syringe and concealed needle that injects a single dose of medication when you press it against your thigh.

If you've been diagnosed with alpha-gal syndrome, your doctor or allergist likely will prescribe an epinephrine auto-



injector. If you are given a prescription for an epi-pen it is very important that you, and anyone who may need to help you, fully understand how to use it. Ask your doctor or pharmacist for instructions. Don't assume you, or others, will know how to use it.

Symptoms of alpha-gal syndrome may lessen or even disappear over time. This is especially true if you don't get any more bites from ticks that carry alpha-gal. Some people with this condition can eat mammal food products again after 1 to 2 years if they don't get any more tick bites.

Shelly has found support groups on FB that are helping her find things

she can eat and things she cannot. Some people have it so severely they cannot handle things such as wool socks and leather jackets. Others cannot cook using the same pots, pans and utensils as others in the household even if they've been fully washed. Not everyone who has Alpha-gal has such extreme reactions. Some cannot eat the meat but can eat mammal product such as ice cream, cheese and milk. There are some apps that people can use to help. You simply scan a bar code and it will tell you if that product is safe or not.

The "Star Trek: Strange New Worlds" cast stopped by Variety's Studio, presented by Google TV, at the 2024 Comic-Con to discuss the critically acclaimed Paramount+ series.

Rebecca Romjin (Una Chin-Riley) and Ethan Peck (Spock) were joined by showrunners Akiva Goldsman and Henry Alonso Myers to tease what fans can expect about the upcoming third season, including what genres they're looking to tackle and Season 2's cliffhanger ending.

"We have a bunch of ideas for the kinds of genres 'Star Trek' can accommodate. And we continue to try and stretch those boundaries," Goldsman said. "We are trying to, dare I say, go where we have not gone before when it comes to genre. Besides the tried and true, which is some sci-fi adventure and certainly our attempt to remember the cadence of at least regularly, there must be a moral to the story. We're spreading our wings, and we hope you'll like it."

Peck joked that he had no reason to worry about "job security" until he realized that Season 3 would see the majority of the cast turn into Vulcans—the extraterrestrial humanoid species that

attempt to live by logic and reason with as little interference from emotion as possible.

"I did not have to worry about job security until that. I was kind of shocked to see everyone as Vulcans because I know them so intimately, having worked them for several seasons," Peck said. "So, to see them in Vulcan makeup was sort of endearing. I had this really bizarre and surprising sense of 'this is family' because I've been sort of isolated as a Vulcan on the show for the most part."

In addressing questions about the Season 2 cliffhanger and whether Season 3 would bring resolution to the Enterprise's botched rescue mission, with the crew attempting to rescue a planet of human colonists from the villainous Gorn, Alonso Meyers said they were trying to do something that was "classic to Trek."

"When you come back for the second part of a two-parter, it always says 'The Conclusion Of,' so, come season three, I promise you, you will see 'The Conclusion Of."

# THE ZAK PERSPECTIVE STAR TREK: INTO "CON"NESS – COMICON 2024 By Zak Lyon

"There's a lot of things you need to get across this universe: warp drive, wormhole refractors, but first of all, you need a hand to hold."

From the Friendship is Universal Panel SDCC 2024

So here I am once again, breaking down Star Trek news from San Diego Comic Con. Many fans have grand expectations this time of year. I know that as each week passed, I could feel my excitement building. I began to make my predictions of what to expect. I know. I know. That can often lead to disappointment. So even though the announcements may be different from what you expected, just know that I am here holding your hand and we can find the fantastic together, as friends.

The 90-minute Star Trek Universe panel was moderated by actor and filmmaker Justin Simien. (His connection to Star Trek will become more apparent later in the panel). And it was divided into 4 sections.

The first section was devoted to *Strange New Worlds*. The producer, Alex Kurtzman, showrunner, Akiva Goldsman, writer, Henry Alonso Myers and cast members, Ethan Peck and Rebecca Romijn came out on stage. This was the longest section of the panel. More genre bending was promised over the upcoming seasons 3 and 4. A real moment of emotional stretching for Number One. Romance. A Hollywood murder mystery. Now here is where I squeeze your hand a little tighter, friend, if that is okay.

There was a clip showing crew members transformed into Vulcans. And these crew members as Vulcans were instantly cold and bitingly sarcastic. So, are we just making Vulcans mean now? (4 ½ Vulcans to beam down? Poor Spock) While adhering to the philosophy of Surak, there have still been much warmer Vulcans in the franchise's history. I hope we don't lose sight of that. They also announced the casting of Dr. Roger Corby (see the original series) and the promotion of Scotty to series regular. Finally, Kurtzman hinted that a stage show based on the musical episode is being explored.

The *Lower Decks* panel was section 2. Show creator, Mike McMahan, and actors, Tawny Newsome. Jerry O'Connell, Noel Wells and Jack Quaid joined Kurtzman on the panel. It was bittersweet as the show was cancelled and the upcoming season premiering on Oct 24 will be their last. But I saw a bit of hope in some later panels and in the phrase "our last season on Paramount Plus" said by more than one creative. The show has so many fans and the producer and creator encouraged fans to watch season five over and over. Maybe you can do for *Lower Decks* what you did for *Prodigy*, they implied. There will be personal growth, legacy characters and a little bit of closure – but not as much as Mike McMahan would have wanted.

I have a strong feeling, however, that we will see these characters again. Semien asked Tawny Newsome to hang back when the panel was dismissed. She and Justin teased the audience about a new series that they were working on. It was a whole lot of silliness, but alas no real details until Alex Kurtzman jumped in and said it was a live-action-comedy series. The tag line was revealed to be: "Federation outsiders serving a gleaming resort planet find out their day-to-day exploits are being broadcast to the entire quadrant." I hold your hand tighter here...live action comedy I can deal with, but not a reality show! Fingers crossed.



Section 3 gave us a taste of *Star Fleet Academy*. Noga Landau, show runner, joined the panel. I really enjoyed the video that introduced each "cadet" as they received the news that they were cast in the show. Filming starts soon. I am looking forward to this and am hoping I don't have to wait too long. In addition to previously announced leads Holly Hunter and Paul Giamatti, legacy Trek characters were announced – Jett Reno, Admiral Vance and Sylvia Tilly from *Discovery* will be joining the cast. And from Voyager, Robert Picardo's Doctor will now be at Starfleet Academy. Since the show is contemporary with *Discovery*, I feel any of our favorite characters could pop in. In

response to two audience questions about disability inclusion, it was revealed that the cast would include a deaf character and that they had just finished designing a wheelchair with a Starfleet Delta.

Section 31 was next. Hey, I never said I was good at math! Alex Kurtzman was joined by director Olatunde Osunsanmi and cast members, Sam Richardson who plays a chamoloid shapeshifter, Casey Rohl who plays a young Rachel Garrett, and Omari Hardwick who plays a character named Alok Sahar. But before they could get started, a threatening video interrupted the panel. It was the Emperor! (Michelle Yeoh could not attend.)

This TV movie has a very different feel. It was called a spy-fi and alternately a "beautiful mess." After watching the trailer, it looks action-based and a lot of fun. It did not seem to have a Trek vibe to me, but the trailer was not designed to showcase the Trek world. Movies are different. We did not get a date. Hopefully we will on Star Trek Day next month. And guess what? Alex Kurtzman encouraged the audience to watch it and they might get more. Not just Section 31 but just movies in general made for TV. I'm going to give this a shot. The actors introduced looked like they would quickly become favorites and I am eager to see how Rachel Garrett fits in.

Three smaller Trek panels addressed *Prodigy*, IDW comics and the Intergalactic Friendship Day with Producers Russell T Davies and Alex Kurtzman. The *Prodigy* panel thanked fans for their enthusiasm/hard work which allowed season two to be seen this summer on Netflix and encouraged them to continue, teasing that with the same effort Netflix could order season three.

The second panel focused on *Doctor Who* and Star Trek over the years and their messages of exploration, hope and friendship. A crossover game was announced utilizing characters from *Doctor Who* and *Lower Decks*. The producers said that if fans wanted a live action crossover, they need to make sure the powers that be know. Finally, the IDW panel revealed the continuing adventures of *Lower Decks* in a vibrant new comic.

So, to wrap the weekend up... No news about upcoming theatrical movies, *Lower Decks* final season begins Oct 24, *Strange New Worlds* season 3 in 2025 with season 4 filming in the spring, *Section 31* movie is finishing up post-production and will be coming soon, *Starfleet Academy* series begins filming this month, we have a new mobile Doctor Who/Star Trek crossover game and a new IDW comic run based on *Lower Decks*, Prodigy is very popular for Netflix, and finally a new live action comedy series is in development set in the 25<sup>th</sup> century.

Maybe what you were hoping for wasn't on the list, but we sure are getting a lot more Star Trek. And as expressed at virtually every panel, the fan response is important – make your voice heard and you may get results.

I'll close out with the best audience question. The fan said when he was young, he saw the message of Star Trek as conflict resolution and that "currently we seem to be living in a time with a lot of conflict and not much resolution. In that light, what is the message that you want to leave to a new generation of fans". Alex Kurtzman responded with: "I think we can't just define ourselves as the things that we don't want to be or the things that we disagree with. I think we have to define ourselves by the things that we believe in and the things that we do want to become. I think that is a big part of what Star Trek has to say." So, with an open mind and the hand of a friend, lets fly!
